A HEALTHIER CONDITION.

STATEMENTS compiled by the Southern Pacific of car-
 load shipments of agricultural products in and out of
 Rogue river valley points for the past six years, indicate a
 more diversified production and a healthier condition for
 the valley than existed at the beginning of the period. We
 are producing more of our own food, and importing less of
 the essentials, despite the fact that 1913 was the last year
 in which we enjoyed anything like a normal rainfall. The
 effect of the prolonged drouth upon fruit is seen in the fact
 that the apple shipments out of the valley were nearly
 twice as large in 1913 as in any subsequent year, and six
 times as heavy as in 1918—despite the steadily increasing
 acreage in bearing.

Shipments of canned goods in 1913-14-15, into the val-
 ley, exceeded the canned goods shipped out—in fact in the
 latter two years there were no exports. The imports for
 1918 were four cars, the exports 15, with the same propor-
 tion the year previous.

It is in flour and food however, that the greatest im-
 provement has been made. In 1913, '15 and '16, we im-
 ported 1279 cars of flour and feed that we should have pro-
 duced ourselves. The imports were cut in 1918, to 79
 cars, while 16 were exported—indicating a field for in-
 creased production. Grain shipments also show a gain.
 Whereas in the first five years of the six year period, the
 figures stood: grain imports 200 cars, exports, 5 cars, in
 1918 there were 5 cars of grain imported and 19 exported.

There is a home market for increased garden product,
 as revealed by the shipment into the valley in 1918 of 26
 cars of vegetables against the shipment out of 3 cars. Dur-
 ing the entire period, twice as many cars of vegetables
 were shipped in as exported.

Potatoes offer another field for increased production.
 Not since 1913 have potato exports equalled imports. In
 1918, there were 33 cars of imports to 1 car of exports.
 For the entire period, potato imports were 293 cars and ex-
 ports 27 cars.

The output of livestock was less in 1918 than for any
 of the five years previous. Cattle exports decreased from
 146 cars in 1915 to 76 in 1918, hogs from 75 cars to 15 cars,
 sheep from 75 to 42.

Nearly all these decreased yields are the direct result of
 the unprecedented drouth. With irrigation, the produc-
 tion of all crops will be steadily increased and exports in-
 almost every line exceed imports. But the table shows a
 gradual increase in production despite unfavorable condi-
 tions and a nearer approach to restoring the balance of
 trade.

Bolsheviki Menaces the World

(Paris despatch from Herbert Bay-
 ard Swope to New York World.)—
 All the world is sitting in the crater
 of a Bolshevik volcano. Only states-
 manship of the farthest vision and of
 the wisest operations can prevent an
 eruption which will engulf the present
 social system and wipe out the prin-
 ciple of democracy resting upon the
 freedom of the individual protected by
 laws of property rights and national
 sovereignty.

Personal observation and credible
 information lead the writer to the
 belief that England today stands less
 affected by the spread of the propa-
 ganda, not even barring America
 from the comparison. England's
 freedom from infection is due to the
 scientific development of the labor
 movement including the "hand and
 brain workers." She has projected
 an internal policy for human better-
 ment far advanced over other na-
 tions.

France, Italy, Belgium, Spain, the
 Balkans and our own country have
 had their eyes fixed outward, with
 scarcely a thought for internal af-
 fairs. The old-fashioned idea that
 food in their stomachs and clothes on
 their backs are sufficient to check
 the appetites of the proletariat is
 daily being proved a dangerous fal-
 lacy.

Political Evolution Their Aim

The workers' insistence is laid upon
 their participation in and direction
 of affairs in which their interest is
 paramount. They decline to be the
 base of the pyramid, and seek to
 bring about a new structure in which
 class stratification shall be absent,
 all being called on for equal effort,
 sharing equally the gains.

Apostles of the movement see in
 it a play for political evolution. Ac-
 cording to their precepts, civilized
 man has passed through three ages,
 and is now ready for the fourth. The
 first was feudalism, when a small
 number of powerful self-created nobles
 held the rest in serfdom; the second
 was monarchism, with autocracy
 holding sway; the third was democ-
 racy, with theoretical individualism
 eliminated in practice by wage slav-
 ery, and now comes what the Bolshe-
 vists proclaim as the true socialized
 state, based on collectivism, with
 wealth communistic and the abolition
 of what the extreme socialist regard
 as the triad upon which rests the
 modern structure of society, namely,
 rent, interest on debt and profit.

These three points are the bete noir
 of the communism preached by the
 Bolshevik supporters and toward
 which their antizionish is mainly di-
 rected.

 versed human element, the act of
 wisdom is to examine the subject ob-
 jectively and to plan accordingly.
 The widest publicity is more effica-
 cious in fighting the danger than to
 tuck on rose colored spectacles and
 see nothing black.
