## RADICALS LOSE BERLIN ELECTION

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 21.—The independent socialists generally were defeated in the voting in Berlin, according to Berlin advices to the Handelsblad.

At 10 o'clock Monday morning the totals in Berlin were:

German democrats, 33,000; majority socialists, 152,000; independent socialists, 193,000; German people's party, 17,800; German national party, 62,000; centrist, 17,600. This incomplete list gives five majority socialists, 4 independent socialists and two German democrats elected.

At Erfurt the independents polled 24,600 to 13,500 for the majority socialists. The independents, on the other hand, were beaten badly in Dresden, Chemnitz, Hamburg, Magdeburg, Nuremberg and Munich.

## PACKERS ADVISOR WROTE SPEECHES FOR MR. HURLEY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—Thomas F. Logan, a Washington employe of Swift and company and other corporations, testified regarding his connections and his relations with Chairman Hurley of the shipping board and other officials today before the senate agriculture committee, considering legislation to regulate the meat industry.

Mr. Logan said he made suggestions to Mr. Hurley for speeches the latter was to make as chairman of the shipping board, but denied he wrote a book, or speeches for Mr. Hurley. He said he was host at a large dinner for Mr. Hurley when the latter left the federal trade commission.

In addition to being employed as adviser to six corporations at salaries aggregating \$2,700 a month, the witness said he conducted a correspondence agency for several newspapers and magazines.
