DEFEAT BILL TO ALLOW GRADUATES TO TEACH

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 24.—After a lively fight, the lower house of the Oregon legislature voted today against a bill to allow graduates of any standard college or university in the state to teach in the public schools. Representative Mrs. Alexander Thompson, the only woman in the legislature, led the battle against the bill, which was aimed against the normal schools of the state. She declared passage of the measure would be "a step backward" in educational legislation and would lower the standards of teaching. The vote against the bill was 41 to 12.

SEATTLE, Jan. 24.—Flood waters have prevented physicians from reaching the town of Yelm, Wash., where, it is reported, about 100 cases of influenza have appeared, it became known here today. Army doctors from Camp Lewis yesterday made unsuccessful attempts to reach the town.

Yelm is between Tacoma and Tenino. High waters in the Nisqually river have cut the town from Olympia, Tacoma and Tenino.

DIVIDEND OF 400 PERCENT ADMITTED BY CHIEF PACKER

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—J. Ogden Armour, who testified at length this week before the house interstate commerce committee, appeared today before the senate agriculture committee at a continuation of its hearing on bills for regulation of the meat industry. Much of the testimony related to profits.

Asked to explain the stock dividend of 400 per cent declared by his company in 1916, Mr. Armour said this was made possible by the accumulation of a surplus since the establishment of the business.

"But this surplus is in addition to dividends paid to stockholders was it not?" asked Senator Norris of Nebraska.

Mr. Armour said it was.

Mr. Armour in a prepared statement which he previously had presented to the house committee opposed the Kendrick bill providing for the licensing of packing plants.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—Answering inquiries from the trade as to its policy in disposing of wool stocks held by the government, the war department announced today it would continue to sell at public auction such wools as manufacturers might require, but that it would not compete with domestic producers.

FLOODS BLOCKADE TRAINS AT ABERDEEN

ABERDEEN, Wash., Jan. 24.—No trains are moving on any of the three railroad lines centering here. The Northern Pacific attempted to send a train to the Sound cities this morning, but it was turned back by a washout at Oakville. Another washout is reported at Gate. Trains on the Milwaukee has been annulled, and the Oregon-Washington line has been out of operation for two days. A Northern Pacific bridge between Gair and Rochester is washed out. A bridge is gone on the O. W. at Gair.

CHICAGO, Jan. 24.—Big breaks in the value of grain and provisions took place today as a result of heavy selling and apparent lack of buying power. C. O. S. showed losses of 4 to 8 1/2 cents a bushel, oats more than 4 cents and provisions the maximum limit for a single day, 50 to 75.

In a broad way the setbacks to prices were merited to readjustment from a war basis and to efforts to cut the cost of living.
