This gathering will include all those interested in farming residing in territory tributary to Ashland, consequently the event is confidently expected to assume the proportions of a rally on a big scale.

John E. Bryan, consulting mining engineer, formerly in this vicinity, but now connected with the iron ore industry in Minnesota, with headquarters at St. Paul, writes friends interesting facts concerning that industry in Minnesota, which has assumed colossal proportions. That state is now far ahead of any other in iron production, the output in a recent year having been 44,585,422 tons, rivaling Michigan, which ranks second, with Alabama third, New York fourth, Wisconsin fifth, and Pennsylvania sixth. These figures are official from government statistics. It will surprise many to note that Pennsylvania's standing in the list, but it is as a producer of coal and finished iron products that it excels. Mr. Bryan cites the further fact that whereas the entire production of the entire country in a single year increased 40 per cent, the value increased 80 per cent, in other words the specific ton at the mines rose in value from \$1.85 to \$2.34. The Lake Superior district continues to secure the whole country in iron production, that section mining 85 per cent of the entire output in the United States.
