The 65th artillery, on its way to Camp Lewis for demobilization, will arrive in Portland February 16 and leave for Camp Lewis Feb. 17, according to advices received today at Portland by Emory Olmstead, chairman of the soldiers' reception committee. The unit is largely composed of Oregon men. There are 952 officers and men in the unit. It will be a bitter disappointment to Medford people generally to learn that the 65th will come to the Pacific coast by a northern route and therefore will not pass thru Medford enroute to Camp Lewis.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—The battleship Kansas and five transports bringing 500 officers and nearly 8,000 men, were announced by the war department today as having sailed from France. Among the units on board are the 116th engineers (91st division), a battalion of the 368th infantry and a battalion of the 351st field artillery (92nd division) and the 42nd coast artillery.

The Kansas is expected at Newport News February 16 with the headquarters, medical detachment and Companies A, B, C and D of the 116th ammunition train, and the 116th engineers complete.

The transport Harrisburg, due to arrive at New York February 15, has on board the field and staff headquarters and supply company, medical detachment and companies A and G, inclusive, of the 368th infantry. Also on board are 33 casual officers and about 50 sick and wounded.

The Louisville is due at New York February 16 with the field and staff supply company, medical detachment, batteries A, B, C and D.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—Chairman Lever today introduced the bill approved by the house agriculture committee appropriating \$1,000,000,000 to maintain the government's guarantee for the 1918 and 1919 wheat crops. It would confer powers for purchase and sale of wheat and flour to control trading in the wheat, and licensing millers, elevators and dealers, besides extending government control of imports and exports up to December 31, 1920.

M. CAMMANT TO BE CHIEF ORATOR LINCOLN BANQUET

From the advance sale of tickets and other indications the annual Lincoln club banquet to be given by the Lincoln club of Jackson county at the Hotel Medford next Wednesday night will have a capacity attendance. The banquet will begin at 8:30 o'clock, a little later than usual, being held back in order to allow the banqueters to attend the lecture of Irvin Cobb. The Cobb lecture at the Page will begin promptly at 7:30 o'clock. Mr. Cobb will later attend the banquet and make a brief speech there. Several state officers and prominent men of Oregon will also participate in the banquet.

The address on Abraham Lincoln will be delivered by Judge Wallace McCamant of Portland, a former member of the state supreme court. Mrs. Lee Davenport of Portland, chairman of the women's advisory committee of the state central Republican central committee, will be one of the speakers, as will also Colonel H. H. Sarzent, who will deliver a memorandum on Theodore Roosevelt, and Rev. Charles T. Edwards of Ashland. Dick Posey of Ashland will deliver some of his original poems. A special invitation is issued to all discharged soldiers and sailors from the present war to be present.

PASS OPPOSES HIGHER GAS RATES

In its account of the hearing of the application of the Oregon Gas & Electric company to increase its rates, held at Grants Pass before the state public service commission yesterday, the Grants Pass Courier stated that the sentiment of the public there is with the company and that no complaint was made of the service rendered, but that there is decided objection to the rates being raised or the gas plant being shut down.

A number of citizens gave their views of the local situation and it was the general opinion that the income of the company could be increased enough to make at least a self supporting business if the company would make any attempt to increase the number of gas consumers. The testimony showed that for several years past no effort whatever had been made to increase the revenue except to increase the rate, which was done last summer.

The service commission hearing on the company's application is being held at Roseburg today.

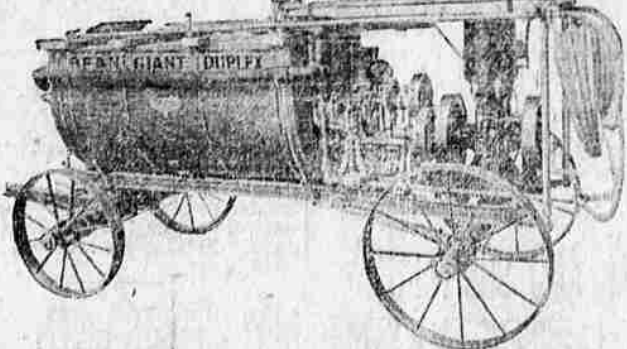
