Women in War Work

Several women's societies have been given reference garments to make and Mrs. Mearns still has a large allotment on hand at Red Cross rooms which she will be very glad to give to ladies desiring to sew at home or to church societies.

One of the details of a plan of co-operation with the Federal Board of Vocational Education is a postal card printed by the American Red Cross in France and given to each returning disabled soldier, so that immediately it may be filled out and mailed to the board upon his arrival in this country, so that the name and address and other essential information thus furnished may lead to the establishment of the proper contact for arranging the man's vocational training.

If each woman in Medford would give an hour or two each week to the Red Cross the load of work now on hand would soon be finished.

An allied anti-typhus train, the control of which is under the American Red Cross commission and to be operated by the American Red Cross is one of the late important features of relief work in Siberia, according to a report which is just at hand from Vladivostok, under date of Dec. 2. The train was sent out thru Siberia to fight the typhus situation which is very grave, and the plan was decided upon by the allied sanitary commission, as a result of recommendations made by the American Red Cross. The funds for this relief work will be supplied by the various allied powers and the train will consist of fourteen cars, including cars for bathing, cars for clothing, drugs and for personnel.

With less than 3 per cent of the population of the nation, the northwestern division of the American Red Cross has enrolled 4.2 per cent of the total Red Cross membership gained in the Christmas Roll Call, so far as reports are in, and at this writing the figures for northwestern division are as follows: Washington 373,174; Oregon 236,000, Idaho 95,000; Alaska 10,000.

The American Red Cross has provided 250,000 articles of clothing for returning Italian prisoners.

The American Red Cross decorated the graves of 1000 American dead at Lunenburg, France, on Dec. 28, 1918.
