

HEAVIEST RAINFALL IN MANY SEASONS DELUGES COUNTY

Not for years has there been such a deluge of rain in a short time as fell Saturday night. This precipitation put Bear creek, Rogue river and the smaller streams of the valley in flood condition.

The Rogue river at flood tide rose 9 and one-tenth feet Saturday and flooded many low places along its route. It was the highest water in the river since December, 1912.

Bear creek was swarming and went on a rampage in a number of low-lying places Saturday night and Sunday. It washed out the bridge on the short cut Agate road, near the P. & E. railroad crossing, Sunday morning.

Word reached Medford today that an unusually heavy rain at Prospect was followed by a snow storm. The heavy rain seemed to be general all over the county, and there were rumors of washouts in the Applegate district.

Not in years has the welcome sight of floods of water standing in orchards of the valley been observed. Even before Saturday night's downpour it was generally conceded that the soil was wetter in Medford and vicinity than it had been for years, although the season was behind in average rainfall.

Many Medford people who thought that Bear creek had never been so high before as yesterday were disillusioned when William Barnum hauled out some old photographs of the famous flood of 28 years ago, caused by 16 inches of snowfall going off with an unusually heavy rain.

All over Medford Saturday night and Sunday the streets were flooded due to the inability of the catch basins to carry away the water soon enough. Most catch basins were clogged up.

PRO-CERMANS AT HELENA SENTENCED TO PRISON AND FINES

HELENA, Mont., Feb. 10.—Four Helena men recently convicted of sedition under the state defense act were sentenced this morning. John Milch to pay a fine of \$1800; Joe Milch, his brother, to pay a fine of \$2900 and to serve from three to six years in the state prison; Adam Stech to serve from one to three years in the state prison and Richard Lobe to pay a fine of \$250.

John Milch, formerly ran a saloon. Lobe's three sons enlisted in the American army, one was killed in France and another still is overseas. Because of this showing, Judge W. H. Poorman, in passing sentence, stated that he would not send Lobe to the penitentiary; that he did not wish to humiliate the sons to that extent. He also warned Lobe not to write to his sons for money with which to pay his fine.

"I understand," said Judge Poorman, "that you have written to the boys commending their action in enlisting. I do not understand what kind of a mind you have."

REPUBLICANS KILL NAVAL BILL ON ORDER POINTS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—Attack on the new naval program of ten dreadnaughts and ten scout cruisers was opened in the house today by Republican Leader Mann, who made a point of order against the provision as soon as it was called up for consideration. He argued that an authorization without an appropriation was not germane and could not be included in the appropriation bill. Points of order were sustained in the house.

This virtually eliminated the program. Representative Garrett, of Tennessee, in the chair sustained Representative Mann's contention that legislation authorizing work for which no appropriation was made was not in order in an appropriation bill. Chairman Padgett of the naval committee then began a parliamentary skirmish to renege the program by inserting an appropriation to begin work on the proposed capital ships.
