MONTANA ELECTION FRAUDS TO BE PROBED

HELENA, Mont., Feb. 18.—The senate committee on privileges and elections this morning reported for passage the resolution introduced last week by Senator H. A. Gallway of Silver Bow county, authorizing an investigation of the alleged election frauds in Butte and appropriating \$100,000 to defray the expense of the inquiry. It is under the charges of fraud made that the seats of nine Silver Bow democrats in the house are now being contested. A similar resolution was introduced in the house by Kelly of Silver Bow, but has not yet been reported out of committee.

SMELTERS REDUCE EMPLOYEES WAGES

EL PASO, Tex., Feb. 18.—A reduction in wages for employees of the El Paso smelting works, one of the American Smelting and Refining company's chain of smelters, was announced today. Employees receiving \$2.50 per day or more will be reduced 50 cents. Those receiving between \$2 and \$2.50 will be reduced to \$2, and laborers getting \$2 will receive \$1.75.

OBITUARY

DAVIS—George Norman Davis was born in Avoca, New York, April 17, 1857, and passed away at Central Point, Oregon, Sunday, February 16, 1919. At the age of eight he moved with his parents to Princeton, Ill., where he spent the most of his young manhood, going to Holdrege, Neb., at the age of 30, remaining there until he came to Lewiston, Idaho, in 1894. In 1907 he went to California and from there he came to the Rogue river valley. Mr. Davis has been in poor health for a number of years and for the last six months has been confined to the house.

Mr. Davis was a man of strong constitution and he made a valiant fight for life.
