moved when a soldier entered a battle. Say Y. M. C. A. leaked

Governor Allen was not at the front, General Traub said, but he afterward modified his statement, saying he had an impression that the Kansas governor was seen by him at the triage. Several days before the beginning of the battle, General Traub said, he had sent the Y. M. C. A. workers, including Mr. Allen, to the rear, so as to guard the secrets of the operation.

"Have you any reason to believe that there might be a leak through the Y. M. C. A.?" asked Representative Campbell.

"Yes," answered General Traub, who explained that while the division was in the Vosges the time of a raid was learned by people far in the rear and that it was possible a Y. M. C. A. worker went there for supplies, had casually mentioned the operations without intention of informing the enemy.

"If the Germans knew what was coming not a single man would have come back alive," declared the general, "but it was pulled off and was successful. We never took a chance with the boche."
