

WASHINGTON BONE DRY FROM TODAY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—Except for the foreign embassies and legations, Washington went "bone dry" today under a provision of the new revenue law withdrawing the immunity which the capital heretofore has enjoyed from the Reed amendment forbidding the importation of intoxicants into prohibition territory.
