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NEW LAW BARS SHEEP AND GOATS ON CATTLE RANGE

SALEM, Feb. 27.—A bill introduced by the Jackson county delegation has passed both houses and been sent to the governor which is designed to protect cattle ranges from sheep and goat growers, reads as follows: Section 1. No person owning or having charge of sheep or goats shall herd, graze, or pasture the same, or permit or suffer them to be herded, grazed or pastured, on any cattle range in Jackson county, Oregon, usually occupied by any cattle grower, either as a spring, summer or winter range for his cattle.

Section 2. Priority of possessory right, between cattle owners and owners of sheep or goats, or both, to range in Jackson county, Oregon, shall be determined by the priority in the usual and customary use of such range, either as cattle range or sheep or goat range.

Section 3. Every person owning any sheep or goats, and every person having charge thereof, who shall herd, graze or pasture any such sheep or goats, or who shall suffer the same to be herded, grazed or pastured on any cattle range in Jackson county, usually occupied by any cattle grower either as a spring, summer or winter range for his cattle shall be liable to such cattle grower for a penalty of not more than \$100 for each day, or portion thereof, which he shall so herd, graze or pasture said sheep or goats upon such range, which penalty may be recovered by the person entitled thereto in an action at law.

CHILD WELFARE.

THE most complete child's welfare code yet compiled is that now pending before the Missouri legislature, the result of an effort to standardize children's laws. It is the work of a special commission appointed for the purpose and contains 51 laws.

The code provides for support of children born out of wedlock; raises the age of consent to 16 years; establishes the marriage age at 15; abolishes common law marriages; provides for extradition of child deserters; provides for punishment of adults responsible for child delinquency; establishes a state home for dependent children; establishes a bureau for mental defectives at the University of Missouri to serve courts, schools and institutions in examination of defectives, and provides special classes in public schools for feeble minded, deaf, blind and crippled children. Marriage of feeble-minded and epileptics would be prohibited.

The code's labor section prohibits employment of children under 14 in any occupation unless an employment certificate has been obtained, except during vacation periods. Boys over 12 years and girls past 18 could engage in street trades if licensed and supplied with badges after special examination. Children under 16 could not be employed more than 8 hours a day or 48 hours a week, and children under 21 could not work as night messengers. Special permits would be required for children under 16 working under ground, on power machinery, or on the stage.

Completion of the eighth grade would be necessary before employment certificates were issued, and the compulsory school attendance age would be raised to 16, unless the child had finished the eighth grade. Poverty of parents would not be grounds for school exemption.

The state board of health would have charge of a division of child hygiene and would regulate conditions and provide physical examination. Such authorities would be required to open schools for public meetings or community purposes.

The county superintendent of public welfare would be charged with administration of the laws and, with his assistants, would act as probation, attendance and parole officers for children.

The nation is awakening to the necessity of looking after the child to insure the welfare of the adult. No nation can long prosper that neglects the children and permits their exploitation. They are the country's most valuable and hitherto most neglected asset for upon them depends the future. Neglect of the children is a contributory cause to the decay and deterioration of a people and of a civilization and proper care of them is national insurance.

TAILING THE PROCESSION.

AN EFFORT was made to pass a bill in the Oregon legislature to establish double election boards, one to count while the votes are cast, so that the result of an election will be known within a few hours after the closing of the polls, but the statesmen of the senate promptly killed the measure. That Oregon should act quickly in an up-to-date fashion was against their principles, and they desire to perpetuate the present system whereby it is frequently a week before the result of an election is known.

The double election board has been tried out in both Kansas and West Virginia and proved a great success. These states are among the first in the union to announce the result. California, Washington, Montana, Idaho and other western states have similar measures pending and at the next election, Oregon will probably have the proud distinction of tailing the procession in election counts.

The proposed California law does not in any way affect the secrecy of the ballot, as the election officials and attendants are under oath not to divulge the vote until the poll is closed. The added expense is comparatively trifling.

Allies Repulse Bolsheviki.

ARCHANGEL, Feb. 26.—(By Associated Press.) Bolsheviki troops on Monday attempted a counter-attack against the newly-gained allied positions on the Murmansk front, but were repulsed with heavy losses. The Bolsheviki used an armored train in their ineffectual attempt.

'Oppose Sinking German Ships.

PARIS, Feb. 27.—"The French delegation to the peace conference will energetically oppose the sinking of the German fleet," says Stephane Lauzanne in the Matin. "The French government," he adds, "is firmly determined to use the ships which fall to France."

RESTOCKING STREAM WITH TROUT AND SCREENING DITCHES FIRST FRENCH MUSICAL BODY TO TOUR AMERICA

J. W. Berrian, superintendent of the Hatte Falls fish hatchery, has received 200,000 evel cut-throat trout eggs, the first consignment of the year for hatching and feeding at Hatte Falls and liberation next autumn in the Hatte creek and other streams. The eggs arrived in fine condition and are the best ever received here. Other consignments are expected shortly. They were sent from the Bonneville hatchery by Master Fish Warden Clanton upon the request of G. Putnam, who petitioned for a million cut-throat or black spotted trout eggs from the state and another million from the federal bureau of hatcheries for the Elk Creek hatchery. Similar requisitions from the same source last year resulted in the hatching and liberation of three-quarters of a million cut-throat fry fingerlings in the Rogue and its tributaries, in which there has been a gradually increasing shortage of cut-throat, due to increased fishing, lack of propagation and wastage of irrigation ditches.

With the campaign for screening the ditches well underway by Superintendent of Screens Aitken and the excellent cooperation of the bureau of fisheries and the state fish game commission in hatchery work, it is hoped that the streams will soon be restocked with abundance of cut-throat as well as steelhead, of which several million are annually liberated.

Seventy fish screens, covering the more important ditches, including all Rogue river ditches between McLoud and Bybee bridges, have been installed by Mr. Aitken. Ditches on Bear creek, Emigrant creek, Neil creek, Little Hatte creek, Wagoner creek, Evans creek and Applegate from Palmer creek to Ruch have been screened. Orders for nearly a hundred more screens have been filed and the screens are being manufactured for installation this spring, which will cover all the important ditches from
