

### RICHARD CARLE COMING TO PAGE IN FURS AND FRILLS

In "Furs and Frills" he has a most delightful role which is fertile with big laugh opportunities, none of which are overlooked by the comedian. He makes it a genuine laugh frolic for his audiences and those who do not care for laughter, are advised that "Furs and Frills" is no show for them. Edward Clark and Silvio Helm are responsible for the book, lyrics and musical score. The former has a tangible plot which boasts of originality, the lyrics are aligable and the music is the sort that catches the ear and is remembered. It might be said that several of the big musical hits hypnotize the ear. There is a beauty chorus which is even superior to the beauty choruses seen in Mr. Carle's former musical successes, among which may be mentioned "The Tenderfoot," "Mary's Lamb," "Jumping Jupiter," "The Mayor of Tokio," "The Spring Chicken," and "The Cohan Revue."
