

ASHLAND AND VICINITY

Ashland soldier boys are coming home in relays of a few each, especially members of the 65th regiment. On Saturday, responsive to a general "alarm," a good share of the town was on hand at the depot when No. 13 arrived in the morning. John Enders was about the first one who landed on the platform, the initial bunch on this train numbering a half dozen. Up to Sunday morning Earl Diegel, Elbert Farlow, Cecil Norton, Frank Hibbs, Arthur Erickson, Everett Becklin, Edwood Hedberg, Meredith Beaver, Roy Hartley, Earl Burnett, Herbert Bentley, and possibly a few others had reached home on various trains. More are due on Monday—Harold Simpson among the number—in time for the homecoming event, which will be a reception at the Elks building, Monday, at 8 p. m., to welcome all soldiers and sailors in our midst. All of the foregoing, except Hartley, had been overseas. Most of them belonged to Battery C of the 65th. On the voyage over the boys traveled "first-class" on the giant Mauretania of the Cunard line, a sister ship of the Lusitania of tragic memory. On the return trip the passage was made in a humble British freighter manned principally by "cooties," according to John Enders, who said he counted them in units respectively, by companies, battalions, and brigades, until the census was lost sight of in division and corps formation. Demobilization and debussing occurred simultaneously at the port of call. The boys are looking fine, none of the ones herein mentioned having met with severe illness either at home or abroad. Frank Hibbs was the only one temporarily put out of action by being seasick. Of course it is taken for granted that everybody is invited to the homecoming greeting, Elks Temple, Monday evening, March 3, where a rousing welcome awaits the returning soldier and sailor lads.

These do not include the arrivals on specific troop trains, which if registered would have added 5000 more to the number. Take an inventory of your jams, jellies, preserves, and miscellaneous goodies remaining on pantry shelves, and at once declare a bonus dividend out of your liberal supply in behalf of the canteen service which systematizes the methods of passing out these delicacies to the boys passing to and fro.

A notable social event of the pre-Lenten season will occur on Tuesday afternoon this week, March 4, when by special invitation the lady Elks of Medford will be the guests of their sisters of Ashland Lodge 944, entertainment to be in the spacious parlors of the local temple.

On Saturday last interest in basketball contests was second only to eagerness displayed in welcoming home the returning soldiers. Athletic enthusiasts lined the streets, while the student body paraded in serpentine formation from the library to the Plaza, executing a number of opportune stunts to the accompaniment of ferocious yells. The visiting team from Roseburg lined in all the pleasantries most good naturedly. The game at the high school gym was a corker. Roseburg not only met defeat, but a rout, the score being 63 to 13 in favor of Ashland. The game on the preceding Thursday evening resulted in a victory for Ashland, 51 to 11 being the score. The Roseburg girls, however, won over Ashland girls on that date. The preliminary on Saturday night was won by Talent high over the Ashland second team. The Roseburg team left for home on Sunday morning, in fine spirits over their cordial reception here, hospitalities culminating in a fine banquet tendered them by the local players at Rose Bros., after the game Saturday night, in which social events both teams and a number of friends participated.
