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WARNING GIVEN BY PREMIER TO LABOR COMMITTEE

LONDON, March 4. — Premier Lloyd George, in addressing the first meeting today of the joint committee of employers and employees constituted by the industrial parliament last week said:

"Civilization, unless we try to save it, may be precipitated and shattered to atoms. It can only be saved by the triumph of justice and fair play to all classes alike."

The premier warned the committee that it was the trustee of the welfare and safety of the whole nation. Unemployment must be banished, he said, and the workers must never again be put in dread of the horrors of distress and hunger.

"Let the workers understand," the premier declared, "that where there is an increase of produce they will get a fair share of it."

Mr. Lloyd George said that what was wanted was more confidence and understanding between employers and employees. The employers must never again say "you are earning too much, your wages must come down."

The task of supplying the world with material had fallen to the United States and England, and possibly Japan, the premier continued.

cord the senate against the constitution of the League of Nations as now drawn.

As a counter-measure, Senator Lewis of Illinois, democratic whip, prepared a resolution proposing that the senate approve "all proper efforts" of the president to effect a League of Peace.

While Senator Sherman was speaking, Senator Jones of New Mexico, sought unanimous consent to present a favorable report of the woman suffrage committee on the suffrage resolution, but the Illinois senator blocked his efforts by refusing to yield the floor.

Senator Martin, democratic leader, announced that the general deficiency bill would be kept before the senate either until passed or until the session expired.

Nominations Killed

Senator Martin said that according to the plan, no executive session would be held. That would mean the nominations of A. Mitchell Palmer, to be attorney-general, John Skelton Williams to be comptroller of the currency, and many other nominations including those of hundreds of postmasters, would remain unacted upon.

Senator Smith of South Carolina, chairman of the interstate commerce committee, and Senator Overman, of North Carolina, were among those who went to the president's office and urged that since the republicans had defeated the essential appropriation bill the railroads be returned to their owners forthwith.

The president gave none of his callers any intimation of his plans regarding the disposition of the railroads. Some senators advised him to return them immediately to private ownership, but the president received all advice without comment.

THE SENATE FIASCO.

A GAIN a little group of "wilful men" in the senate have been enabled by filibustering in the closing hours of congress to block vital legislation and nullify the work of months of deliberation. The situation is parallel to that of the closing days of the 64th congress two years ago when a handful of senators sought to prevent war with Germany.

The crisis thus precipitated resulted in public outcry against the absurd rules that governed this most deliberative of bodies and reform was demanded, but the senate, which would reform the world, refuses to reform itself and continues glaringly inefficient. Any proposal that interferes with the sacred rights of a trifling minority to block the majority, is regarded as sacrilege.

The war congress enacted much vital legislation, but originated none of it. It spewed and stewed and scolded and berated, over the important war legislation outlined by the president, and passed it because forced to by public sentiment—but showed no constructive statesmanship of its own.

When the president left for France, congress was given free hand to settle the railroad problem and the problems of readjustment. It investigated every subject under the sun except its own efficiency, spent months in assailing the executive, in a never ending spouting geyser of abuse, but it did nothing. With millions of soldiers being demobilized, it refused to provide work for them and kept industry closed by delay in settling war contracts.

The last session has been remarkable for a recrudescence of unreasoning and unreasonable partisanship unequalled since the civil war. The country's welfare was entirely lost sight of in the effort to secure partisan advantage and indulge in personal animosities towards the president. And as a result, chaos ruled the closing hours and a real injury has been done the army, the navy, the railroads, the industrial and financial interests of the nation.

schools of England by private tutors. In 1875, four years after he came from England, the young farmer married Isabel Carpenter, of Farmington, Oregon. Three sons and one daughter were born to them and one of the sons enlisted in the service of his country soon after the outbreak of war.

Following his successful breeding of livestock—cattle, horses and sheep, which brought him prominence as one of the most progressive farmers of Oregon, the future governor entered the service of the state in 1889 as state veterinarian. He served until 1898 when he became director of the Oregon Experiment Station at the Agricultural college. In 1914 he was first elected governor of Oregon.

The honorary degree of master of agriculture was conferred upon Mr. Withcombe by the Oregon Agricultural college, while he was director there. At various times he acted as trustee of the Oregon Academy of Science, secretary of the Pacific Wool Growers' association and president of the Northwest Stockbreeders association. He was chairman of the republican county central committee of Washington county for two years and was a member of several fraternities and fraternal organizations.

HIGHWAY WORK TO BE PUSHED IN JACKSON COUNTY

J. C. McLeod, district engineer of the highway commission, spent Monday in Ashland and arranged with City Engineer Walker to begin at once the survey of the route of the Pacific highway from the city limits of Ashland to the foot of the Siskiyous, to connect with the present grade. The middle route of the three proposed has been decided upon by the commission and bids will be advertised for the grading as soon as the surveys are completed and plans drawn.

Mr. McLeod is spending today arranging for two surveying crews to begin work tomorrow on the Pacific highway from Central Point north to the Josephine county line. This work will be in charge of M. Drinkwell and Roy Nunn and will be pushed as rapidly as possible so bids can be asked for. This route has not been definitely decided upon yet.

Mr. McLeod says it is the desire of the commission, as well as Engineer Herbert Nunn and himself to push the work in Southern Oregon as rapidly as possible. Bids for the paving of the Siskiyous will be received in April and work started in May. The work on the Green Springs mountain road from Ashland to Klamath Falls, most of which has been located, will also begin soon.
