

## PORTLAND MAYOR SAYS GOVERNORS BETTER WAKE UP

WASHINGTON, Mar. 4.—A clash between Governor Edge of New Jersey and Governor Cox of Ohio, developed today at the conference of governors and mayors out of an attack by Governor Edge on the government's policy of "trying to do too much for the people." Governor Cox said the government was not doing enough.

Mayor George L. Baker of Portland, Ore., ridiculed the procedure of the conference, saying the governors failed to recognize serious social conditions in their states with which mayors of cities were in touch. "The first governor speaking at this conference who knew the trouble with his state was Governor Cox," said Mayor Baker. "You governors don't know anything that is wrong. You had better find out in a hurry, and you had better do something now to correct it. I think we have not had anything so far in this conference except conversation. It is high time to develop definite policies for dealing with unemployment and social unrest."

## RAILROAD FUTURE STILL A PUZZLE

WASHINGTON, March 4.—Director General Hines, commenting today on the failure of congress to pass the \$750,000,000 appropriation for the railroad administration, said he had not come to any conclusion concerning the government's future course in regard to the railroads.

Other administration officials, however, were studying the war finance corporation act with a view to determining whether that corporation has authority to make advances to the railroads and eliminate the necessity of premature relinquishment by the government.

## REDDY GUILTY OF ASSAULTING ENGINEER

SAN FRANCISCO, March 4.—After having been admonished by the court for attempting to engage in an argument with court attendants, Dr. J. P. Reddy, former mayor of Medford, Ore., and former chief of police of Spokane, was found guilty in the police court here today of battery on the person of E. H. Wedekind, a mining man. Sentence will be passed tomorrow.

Reddy was alleged to have knocked Wedekind down in a local hotel following a quarrel over charges of progermanism that were passed between the two men.

Wedekind was employed by Reddy last summer as engineer at his Siskiyou chrome mine.
