

### RED CROSS AT ASHLAND BUSY ON RELIEF WORK

ASHLAND, Mar. 7.—Renewed effort in behalf of Red Cross activities is the order of the day. Granted the war is over demands for relief on a colossal scale will be forthcoming for months. Locally three units of the Red Cross contribute to the grand work of the organization, and altho laboring in distinct channels, the benefit in general is merged for the common good of the mightiest factor in the world's history for relieving distress incident to war, pestilence, fire and flood, or any other widespread calamity. Ashland's three units in this beneficent work include the initial association with headquarters in the Elks building, where spacious rooms are generally provided in which the "bum of industry" prevails during several afternoons of each week. From this center radiates other phases of effort along divergent lines. The canteen service at the depot affords first aid in any emergency, the thus far its chief laborers have been confined to rendering minor comforts to the thousands of men who have passed thru this terminal during the war period and the demobilization epoch which is following in its wake. Thirdly, the salvage corps commercializes effort on a revenue basis, and the general merchandise depot in Camps block has cleared hundreds of dollars which have been diverted to various channels in reinforcing the financial status as to income and outgo.

### McNARY PLANNING TRIP TO EUROPE

WASHINGTON, March 6.—If the time after the congressional adjournment before an extra session of congress appears to be sufficient, Senator McNary intends to make a trip to Europe. The difficulty is to decide how much time will be available. Mr. McNary says he wants to look over the camps and see the situation of the American forces overseas at first hand, as an aid to his understanding of the problems connected with demobilization, and expects also to see some of the famous battlefields. If time permits the Oregon senator hopes to be able to visit the region of the proposed extension of Crater Lake National park. Under a bill he has introduced, which has the strong endorsement of the national park service and Secretary Lane, the limits of the park would be enlarged to include Diamond lake. Director Mather of the park service has invited Mr. McNary, to look over the proposed extension with officials of the party, and the senator hopes to be able to do so.

### ALARM ROUTS OUT PRESIDENT ON SHIP

ON BOARD U. S. S. GEORGE WASHINGTON, Mar. 7.—(By wireless to the Associated Press.) President Wilson's rest this morning was cut short by the sounding of a general alarm summoning all hands to the boats to abandon ship. The signal for the boat drill came at 9 o'clock and the president arose and escorted Mrs. Wilson to her boat. He adjusted Mrs. Wilson's and his own life belt and stood quietly by until the drill was completed. The president today sent a wireless message to William J. Bryan, who has been ill. The weather cleared today and the sea was smooth.

### RAILROAD POLICY TO KEEP EMPLOYEES

WASHINGTON, March 7.—Railroads generally are not laying off employees as a result of the failure of congress to appropriate funds for the railroad administration, it was said today at the office of Director General Hines. A few cases of dismissal of a number of men have been reported to headquarters here, but in each case it was said the reasons were related to operating conditions rather than to the financial predicament.

### REPUBLICAN LOSES BY OPPOSING LEAGUE

GREENSBURG, Pa., Mar. 7.—For the first time in 50 years a democrat was sent to congress from the Westmoreland (Butler county) congressional district today. John H. Wilson, running on a strictly Wilson platform, endorsing the League of Nations plan and condemning the republican filibuster in the last days of congress, defeated John M. Jamison, his republican opponent, by a plurality of 473 votes.

### DEL NORTE MINES SOLD TO PROMOTORS OF NEW RAILROAD

What purports to be the largest and most significant mining deal ever staged in Del Norte county, says the Crescent City Triplet, centers around the sale by the Del Norte Claim Holders association, of eighty-nine quartz claims, in the Preston Peak district, to the Del Norte Mining corporation, presumably a holding company composed of former members of the Del Norte Claim Holders' association and the interests represented by Mr. A. C. Ross, who is planning railroad construction out of Crescent City to tap that region. The papers were presented this week for record at the court house by Rubens, Fischer, Mosser and Barnum, a Chicago firm of lawyers. The amount involved was not made known, but the deal called for an outlay of one hundred and twenty-five dollars worth of internal revenue stamps to make it valid. It has been generally known for some time that the Ross interests were contemplating a location for a profitable division point on the "over the mountains" route, also that the railroad was to be merely a by-product of the greater operations and developments of these people. And with this in mind, it becomes apparent that the opening of this gigantic mining field will offer the proper location for a new townsite, division point, and fertile field for large investments. There were 295 names on the list of grantors attached to the deeds as recorded here, and among them the holders of the present townsite of Waldo, Ore.

### WOUNDED ALLIES WELL CARED FOR

LONDON, Mar. 6.—Allied soldiers who are wounded in the fighting along the Marman coast front are cared for most efficiently, according to a Reuter dispatch. Dog teams and reindeers are used to take the wounded men from the front to Kem, where they are placed on a train which takes them to Murmansk. All the soldiers wear clothing assigned by Sir Ernest Shackleton and very few cases of frost bite have been reported.
