treaty of peace. It is not out of pity for the German people that this must be done and done without delay, but because we, the victors in this war, will be the chief sufferers if it is not done.

Question of Reparation

"You may demand reparation as much as you please, but unless the German people are furnished materials for their industries and commercial opportunities to sell the products of labor in the foreign markets, and unless the laborers have food, Germany can never pay, even in part, for the evil she has done. Furthermore, if the present state of chaos continues, and the political power continues to grow weaker there, will be no government strong enough to carry out the conditions of the treaty of peace."

"I say to you men of France, and men of America, and to you men of the allied powers that there is no time to be lost if we are to save the world from the despotism of anarchy. We must make peace without delay, and ships laden with food must enter

the harbors of Germany. We have reached a crisis in the affairs of the world. We must meet it without hesitation and without permitting our judgment to be warped by a natural and unavoidable desire for vengeance on a nation which has committed such atrocities as those the Germans have committed."
