

SPEED COP'S VICTIM EXPECTED TO MAKE SPEEDY RECOVERY

The condition of Harrison Riggs who was shot and dangerously wounded last Monday night by Deputy Sheriff McDonald was reported as favorable at the Medford Sanitarium this afternoon. He is doing nicely and if no complications set in will make a comparatively quick recovery. The next forty-eight hours will demonstrate whether Riggs is completely out of danger.

The shooting of Riggs has aroused much indignation throughout Jackson county. McDonald, who has been badly upset by Monday night's affair, could not be found today and it was reported that he has gone to his parents' home at Trail for a day or so to restore his shattered nerves.

County Prosecutor Roberts refused to make any comment on the shooting of Riggs, as to the moral right or wrong of it, and lack of judgment shown except to comment that under the circumstances in shooting at the tires of Riggs' auto and unintentionally and accidentally hitting Riggs, the deputy sheriff was probably within his legal rights.

PAPER MILL TO BE BUILT AT SALEM

PORTLAND, Mar. 12.—Business men of Portland and Salem, interested in the Charles K. Spaulding Logging company of Salem and the Crown Willamette paper mills of Oregon City, will establish paper mills in Salem on the site of the old Salem Flouring Mills. It was announced here today. Construction of the plant is to begin shortly and will involve an investment of \$500,000, it was said. F. W. Leadbetter of Portland is one of those interested.

The plan was first made before the war but has just been taken up again. The main building of the mill will be a two-story structure and one piece of machinery alone, it is said, will cost \$125,000. Raw material is conveniently located and also is said to be the intention to use offal from lumber mills for the manufacture of paper.

LABOR CONDITIONS LOCALLY IMPROVED

Local labor conditions are improving according to Supt. Janes of the Medford employment office, who received calls yesterday for several men for ditch work, ranch work, wood cutting, clearing and the like. After a personal visit to the engineers now at work on surveys for the Pacific highway improvements Mr. Janes learned that prospects are good for the employment of many men on the actual construction work in the near future.

The local federal employment office will keep in direct touch with the engineers and contractors, and as soon as the work opens up will be ready to place many returned soldiers and others on this work. He hopes that any discharged soldiers who have had more or less experience in survey work will register at his office immediately.

I. W. W. AGITATORS ON TRIAL IN WICHITA

WICHITA, Kas., Mar. 12.—Under a heavy guard, 32 alleged I. W. W. agitators were brought into the federal court to stand trial on the charges of violating the espionage act. A jury was being empanelled today.

Fred Robertson, federal attorney for Kansas, will endeavor to show a close connection between the I. W. W. and the Bolshevik government. It is said that steamship lists reveal that 10,000 I. W. W. members left this country for Russia during the Kerensky regime and that most of them have returned, among them being a man who took a prominent part in the recent general strike at Seattle.

ST. PAUL, Minn., March 12.—St. Paul is officially being considered for the republican national convention next year, it became known today. The possibility of holding the convention in the local auditorium was discussed with Will H. Hayes, the national chairman, when he conferred with leading Minnesota republicans here recently.

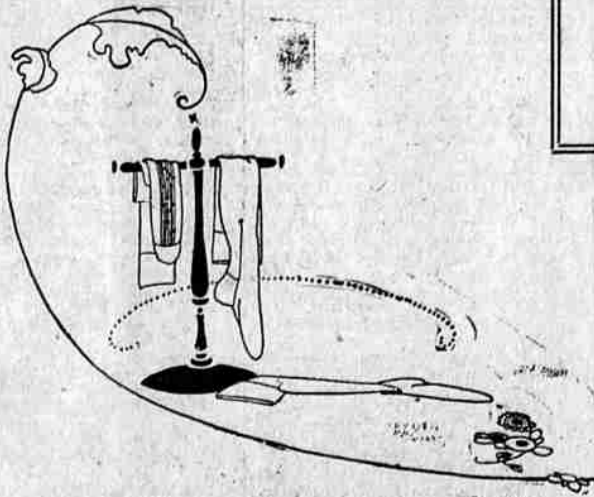
