Steelhead trout egg taking has just begun at the Elk Creek and Applegate stations, states Hugh Mitchell, state superintendent of hatcheries for the United States Bureau of Fisheries, who is here on a trip of inspection. Approximately 100,000 eggs have been taken at each station and it is expected that the usual total of from three to five million eggs will be taken ere the egg-taking season ends, May 1. Approximately 1,250,000 chinook salmon fry are held at the Elk creek hatchery for liberation this spring and summer.
