ALASKA WIRELESS REPORT TO BREMERTON

VALLEJO, Cal., Mar. 17.—Jurisdiction of the government radio stations in Alaska has been transferred from the twelfth naval district station at Mare Island to the thirteenth district station at Bremerton, Wash., because of the constantly increasing traffic at Mare Island, according to an announcement from the office of the Mare Island navy yard commandant here today. The collier Saturn will take a radio crew from this yard to Alaska for the last time in a few days, all crews going from Bremerton thereafter, it was announced.

The work of the Honolulu and Siberian stations will continue to be handled here, it was announced.

EIGHT MILLION FEET OF RAILROAD TIES ORDERED

ABERDEEN, Wash., March 17.—Hooniam mills have an order for eight million feet of lumber for railroad ties, to be delivered on the Atlantic seaboard, it is announced here today. This is the largest lumber order placed here this year. Six steamers will be required to carry it to the east coast. The first cargo will be loaded within 30 days. The French government is expected to be asking for bids on 75,000,000 feet of railroad ties.

GERMANS USED AS PROPAGANDA YANKS OWN JOKE

ATLANTA, Ga., March 17.—A year ago when the 82nd division was in training at Camp Gordon here an enterprising piano company wrote to division headquarters that it had built a piano of such strength and lightness that it could be carried into the first line trenches to help while away the hour on inactive sectors. Officers of the camp made facetious remarks about the instrument, one major whimsically suggesting organization of the 9107th French Piano Battalion.

A local newspaper published a humorous account of the incident, picturing each hawk private of the 82nd going over the top with a "french piano" strapped to his back. Powder puff, route and tin stick might be added to the soldier's knapsack to make trench life bearable, the writer suggested. It caused many a laugh at the camp.

The 82nd soon went to France and took part in some of the hardest fighting of the war. On Aug. 2, 1918, German aviators dropped into their trenches in the Toul sector copies of the identical story with this solemn comment attached:

"What are you fighting for, Sam? While you are fighting and risking your life, the folk back home instead of backing you up with their last dollar and last drop of blood, are spending their time inventing trench pianos and tin sticks instead of inventing submarines and airplanes."

Major Quincy Melton of the 82nd in a letter to a friend here says the men of the 82nd fairly fought for the German leaflets and had the heartiest laugh of their overseas career. There was nothing to show how a copy of the local paper's story was transmitted to Germany.

NO HITCH IN PEACE OVER NATIONS' LEAGUE

LONDON, March 17.—Andrew Bonar Law, government leader in the house of commons, told the body today that to the best of his belief there was no foundation for the report that a hitch had occurred in the presentation to Germany of the draft of the peace terms because of diversions of opinion on the subject of the league of nations.
