

TRY TO MAINTAIN MEDFORD BUREAU FOR UNEMPLOYED

Efforts are being made to have the Medford office of the Federal Employment service kept open for the next two months at the expense of the county, by which time the new congress will have met and made an appropriation to continue the 700 odd federal employment bureaus throughout the country.

Milton S. Jones, the local superintendent of the office, offers to donate his services free to keep the office open, and the only expense the county is asked to provide is for office rent and office incidental expenses.

By closing the office here and keeping it closed for two months, it would take me a long time to get things to running again, and in the meantime many employers and men seeking employment would be the sufferers," said Superintendent Jones today.

Work was just beginning to open up in earnest when the news came that the office would have to close because congress had adjourned without making an appropriation for the maintenance of the federal employment service.

Superintendent Jones is doing a land office business helping soldiers, sailors and marines to file claims for the \$60 bonus recently allowed by congress, and in making papers of their discharge papers.
