MINE WORKERS ASK 5 DAYS WORK OF 6 HOURS EACH

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Mar. 20.—All recommendations for a six-hour day, five-day week, increase in wages and nationalization of coal mines, made by Frank J. Hayes, president of the United Mine Workers of America, were concurred in by the sub-committee of the general policy committee, in its report to the full committee this afternoon. The policy committee met here this afternoon to receive and act on the report. The sub-committee recommended that the full power and influence of the United Mine Workers be used to attain the end of the six-hour day and five-day week.

Another recommendation of the sub-committee was that the international officers of the union be empowered to draft for presentation, to the special convention of the organization when convened a tentative draft of a bill to be presented to congress for the nationalization of all coal mines.

The sub-committee also recommended that the international officers be authorized to wage an extensive and intensive campaign of organization in the anthracite districts and the sparsely organized and non-union bituminous districts.
