

### PUGILISM LOOKS FOR REVIVAL IN IDAHO AND NEVADA

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 20.—With the recent enactment of laws permitting 25 round boxing matches in Nevada and 20 round bouts in Idaho, followers of pugilism look for a revival of ring contests in the west which will, in a measure, approximate the days when the sport flourished here a half a dozen years ago.

It was in Reno that the Jeffries-Johnson championship bout was fought in 1910 for a purse which, up to that time, was the largest ever offered for a ring contest. Being on the direct line of transcontinental railroad travel, and within hauling distance of San Francisco, Reno suffered but little handicap in the matter of getting a crowd to witness the battle.

California is limited by law to four round bouts. An effort is being made in the present session of the legislature to permit of ten round contests. In the event that this is approved it still must be voted on by the people and sanctioned by them before it can become a law.

According to the original plans of Tex Rickard, who is promoting the Willard-Dempsey championship bout, the fight was to have been staged on July 5, at a place not yet determined. Recent developments indicate this date may not be adhered to. According to reports, Rickard is said to have expressed the opinion that the celebration of Independence Day this year might take on a new solemnity owing to the great war, which would make a worse fight out of keeping with the tone and spirit of the holiday, and arouse antagonism.

Both Reno and several Idaho towns are anxious for the proposed contest. The former city has an advantage over its rivals in the matter of being selected by reason of the fact that 25 rounds may be fought in Nevada whereas the law of Idaho permits only 20 rounds. Other conditions which must be weighed by the promoter are accessibility, in order to get his crowd, and the financial inducements made.

### POLISH-GERMAN NEGOTIATIONS OFF

PARIS, March 20.—Negotiations between the inter-allied commission and the German government's representatives at Posen have again been interrupted. It is said that this was the result of the evasive attitude of the German government. Dispatches state that the German high command appears to be in open conflict with the Berlin cabinet, and will not undertake to respect an armistice between the Germans and Poles.

A decision in keeping with the situation is expected tomorrow.

### MEXICO STABILIZES SALARIES OF OFFICIALS

WASHINGTON, Mar. 20.—Word has been received thru official channels of a decree issued by President Carranza of Mexico March 3 enumerating which employees of the government should receive salaries in full and which employees should receive part pay in what are termed "bonds." The action was taken to stabilize or systematize the payment of federal employees, many of whom have not been paid in full for years. The personnel of the supreme court has been the only department receiving full pay. Henceforth, it is decreed, the salaries from the justices down to the clerks are to be cut 25 percent.

### CONCRETE SHIP PROVEN SUCCESS COMES TO STAY

SAN FRANCISCO, March 20.—The concrete ship has come to stay; it is to be a real and active member of the steel ship, according to R. J. Wieg, head of the concrete division of the Emergency Fleet corporation. Wieg has just completed an inspection tour of the five yards where the United States government is turning out concrete ships.

Just a year ago the first concrete ship of commercial size was launched here and was christened the "Faith." Shipping men and particularly structural engineers say that perhaps no ship was ever the subject of so many skeptical forecasts while being built and previous to operation than this. Yet these men declare the name was a happy one and that the faith of her builders has been justified.

The Faith, according to last reports had traveled more than 20,000 miles, and no defects of construction have manifested themselves other than her performance has shown how better concrete ships can be built.

Three ships are being constructed of concrete by the government on San Francisco bay, three in Mobile, Ala., and two each in yards at Jacksonville, Wilmington and San Diego. All with the exception of two, one at San Francisco and one at Mobile, are oil tankers. The two exceptions are being constructed for general cargo, but every boat is of 7,500 tons capacity.

The concrete shipbuilding industry yet is an experiment, recognized authorities said. Designs that seemingly represent the best thought and the ultimate for at least a short period of time, may be discarded in a day.

### I. W. W. MEMBERS SEEK FREEDOM

NEW YORK, March 20.—Counsel for members of the I. W. W. whose names were recently decided unfavorably by the department of labor shifted today to the federal court the fight to save their clients from deportation. A writ of habeas corpus prepared yesterday and signed by 20 men and one woman confined at Ellis Island was the course adopted to bring the prisoners into court for a hearing. The petition recites that the 21 are not detained by any process or mandate issued by any court and in general follows the lines of the legal fight that was successful in gaining the freedom of 12 of the prisoners.

All of the 21 seeking to avoid deportations were recently brought from the west.

**BELGIUM RECOGNIZES POLISH INDEPENDENCE**

BRUSSELS, March 20.—Belgium has recognized the independence of Poland.

### GERMAN VIEW STILL AT VARIANCE WITH THE WORLD

COBLENZ.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Articles in the German press and speeches and interviews with German public men since the armistice went into effect show that the German point of view still is completely at variance with that of the rest of the world, asserts one of the political experts with the American army of occupation.

In a recent article on the question of German psychology, published in the intelligence summary of the Third Army, the political expert who is an officer of high authority, says:

"The German feels that, first and foremost, his army was not only unbroken but had all the military prestige of the war. Then he knew that there was increasing scarcity of victuals at home and, feeling that the allies were in mortal dread of new drives by the German army and would be only too glad to compromise, proposed an armistice.

"Germany expected all the world to supply her gladly with all her needs and, as a mark of good faith, offered to allow them to advance to the Rhine. Now the Germans affect to wonder why Germany is not completely supplied by the allies and why the armistice having been allowed to see the Rhine scenery do not withdraw.

"Of course, the more ignorant classes might be expected to take this attitude but when these ideas appear in addresses by Scheidemann and by the Crown Prince the result is more than puzzling. All the people consider, apparently, that the armistice was an agreement for mutual benefit and any idea that the war was anything but a draw with the prestige all on the German side has not yet penetrated the German mind."

### PERSHING COMPLETES INSPECTION OF ARMY

COBLENZ, Mar. 20.—(By Associated Press.) General Pershing completed his official call on troops in the occupied area of Germany today, devoting the forenoon to an inspection and review of the 4th corps at Cochem-on-Moselle and the afternoon to a review of the 4th division near the same town.

### 60,000 TROOPS IN ONE WEEK RETURN

WASHINGTON, D. C.,—March 19. Troops returning from France during the week ended March 14 numbered 59,454, the largest total for any week since the armistice was signed. 414,278 men had been brought home.

### BRUTAL FORCE ONLY SUCCESSFUL TURKISH POLICY

LONDON, March 1.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—The Turks are by no means convinced that they are vanquished, and show few signs of regret that they were ever the allies of the central powers, according to a French correspondent who has returned from Constantinople. The correspondent attributes this failure on the part of the Turks to realize their actual situation to the fact that the British and French commanders in the Turkish capital have not acted like conquerors and imposed their authority on the Turks.

The correspondent declares that he was unable to convince the leading Turks of the complete victory of the allies and of the definite crushing of the German military power, and adds that this is due to the fact that the allied troops did not enter Stamboul with flags flying, because the allied officers did not install themselves as masters in the different ministries, and because the military authorities did not take over all the administrative offices and police the city.

The committee of union and progress no longer exists, legally, says the Frenchman, but its creatures still occupy their posts in the ministry and in the police service. "They are very active and offer us a very bitter and systematic opposition," he continued. "This frequently takes the form of spreading rumors of disagreement between France and England on the subject of the future of Turkey. They assert that it would be to the advantage of England and France to evacuate Turkey and to leave Constantinople as the Turkish capital.

"On one of the Princess Islands—Prinkipo—the German marshal, Von Sanders Liman Pasha, is comfortably lodged and receives the adherents of the old regime and, between dessert and cheese they openly plot against us without fear of disturbance.

"The Germans who knew the Turks treated them as they should be treated, with brutal force, and that is the only attitude which can be adopted towards them. We should bring home to them the realization that the allies are in reality the conquerors. We must act with energy and firmness, if we desire to retain our predominant influence in Turkey."

### GERMANY TO BAR ENTENTE MISSIONS

BERLIN, Mar. 20.—(By Associated Press.) Because of the great number of military and civil entente missions which have visited Germany since November, the German cabinet has decided, according to newspaper reports, that no person from an allied country will henceforth be permitted to travel in Germany without special permission from the armistice commission.

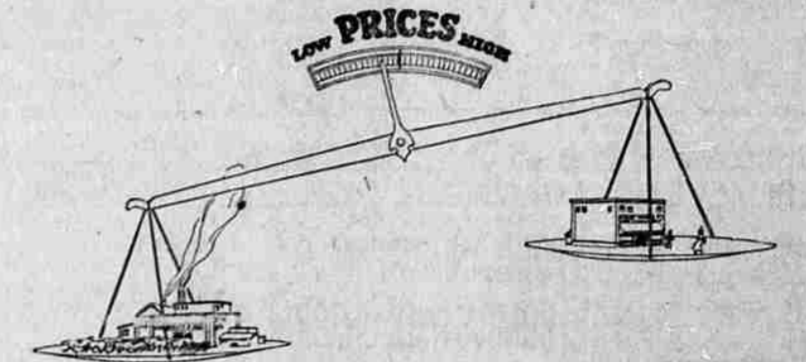

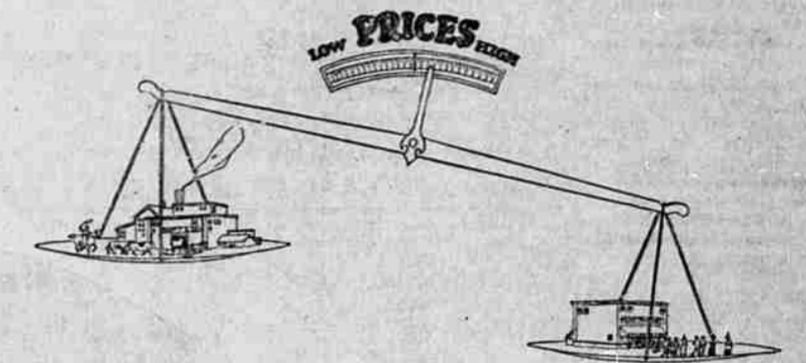
