

PROTESTS ERECTION OF POWER DAM ON LINK RIVER

SALEM, Mar. 20.—R. E. Bradbury, of Klamath Falls, director of the Klamath Irrigation district, appeared before the state land board Tuesday to enlist the action of the board in opposing the project of the government in granting a permit to the California-Oregon Power company to construct a dam at the head of Link river, in Klamath county.

It is contended that if the dam is constructed it would cause the waters of the upper Klamath lake to rise three or four feet, thereby flooding 6000 acres of state swamp lands and also destroying the natural drainage of 150,000 acres of privately owned lands.

In 1905 the Oregon legislature ceded to the United States government the bed of upper Klamath lake, for which Link river is the outlet, for a reservoir for the Klamath Irrigation project, which is a government reclamation project.

The question which Mr. Bradbury presented to the state land board and which will be presented by the board to the attorney general, is whether it was the intention of the legislature, when it passed the act of 1905, to cede to the United States any land above the normal level of the lake or did the state grant the land which is covered by the lake during the spring floods. The government contends that the state ceded to it all the land which the lake covers when at flood stage.

POLES AND LETTS DEFEAT RUSSIANS
