FIUME.

THE Italian delegation to the peace conference is reported to have decided to withdraw from the peace conference and league of nations unless Fiume, is assigned to Italy contemporaneously with the conclusion of peace.

Italy is not so sure of the justice of her claims to Fiume that she is willing to leave them to impartial adjudication. She must realize territorial aggrandizements in advance or upset the plans of world peace.

Fiume had a population in 1900 of 39,955, of which only 17,354, less than 50 per cent, were Italians. Since then the population of Italians is still less.

Fiume was an ancient Liburnian city under another name in the days before Rome ruled the world. Rebuilt by the Romans, it was captured by the Franks under Charlemagne, who ruled the city for a considerable period.

Fiume was occupied by the French in 1809, retaken by the British in 1813, restored to Austria in 1814, and ceded to Hungary in 1822.

The population has been, since the Slav invasions of over a thousand years ago, a mixed one, composed of Italians, Slavs and a few Germans and Hungarians.

Premier Orlando's assertion that Italy cannot "remain insensible to the appeal reaching her from the Italian town on the Gulf of Quarnero, exposed to the loss of both its nationality and independence" may be a convincing one to Italians—but it is not to the world.

Fiume is only one many problems that the peace conferees must equitably solve—and the wonder is, that they have been enabled to accomplish so much.
