A replica of the new homecoming greeting bestowed upon local members of the 65th regiment awaited members of the 69th also. "The Time, the Place and the Gift" were respectively delineated at Elks' Temple on Thursday evening with a bunch of husky 69ers in the line light as the observed of all observers. There was music and dancing, social converse and games, delicious refreshments being served as a climax in the way of hospitalities, all merged in the atmosphere of a hearty welcome which pervaded the Elks' building. In fact, the gladness event reminded one of an ideal family reunion, with fathers and mothers, sisters and brothers as "preferred creditors," the next of kin and a host of dear friends sharing in mutual felicitations. Among the homecomers direct, and including their comrades in the army and navy who preceded them and were present to join in the welcome, a partial list only would embrace Glenn Simpson, Bill Holmes, Jack Jones, Cleo Kirk, Beecher Danford, Leon Baughman, Ralph Fraley, Charles Delman, Edmond Barrett, Bob Keller, O.
