FLOATED TO VICTORY ON A SEA OF OIL

WASHINGTON, Mar. 25.—Gasoline production in the United States in 1918 was said today by Van H. Manning, director of the bureau of mines, to have borne out at least in part the statement of a British admiral shortly after the cessation of hostilities that "we floated to victory on a sea of oil."

A little less than fifty million barrels of gasoline was produced in the United States in 1918, Mr. Manning stated, while in 1917 the production was increased under the spur of war's necessity to 68,000,000 barrels. In 1918 the production was over 86,000,000 barrels.

80 CARS OF FOOD FOR RUSSIAN PRISONERS

COBLENZ, March 24.—(By the Associated Press.)—Eighty cars of food for Russian prisoners in German camps have arrived here. The distributing of the food to different camps will be supervised by American experts.

Two barges of flour have arrived here from Rotterdam, this being the first shipment of supplies for the Third army to come by the way of the Rhine. Consignments of clothing and other supplies are en route.

HOME OF MULTNOMAH COMMISSIONER LOOTED

PORTLAND, March 25.—Burglars looted the home of County Commissioner Ralph W. Hoyt in the absence of the family yesterday, taking more than \$2,000 worth of jewels, according to a report made by Hoyt to the police. CAPTAIN FOSS IN CASUALTY LIST

During the big parade of the welcome home demonstration to the 63rd artillery, overseas veterans, at Seattle, last Thursday, Captain Elmer E. Foss, former city recorder of Medford, and whose engagement was announced a short time ago to a prominent Seattle young woman, suffered a broken leg. The Seattle Times describes the accident as follows:

Only one accident happened during the day, directly bearing on the parade. This was when his mount, slipping under him, fell and pinned Capt. E. T. Foss of the district artillery headquarters staff in the White building underneath. His leg was broken and he was removed to the Providence hospital in a Red Cross motor ambulance which had been in service at the railway station and accompanied the parade for just such an emergency.

Captain Foss was in advance of the first battalion, one of the bands of mounted aides to the parade, when the accident happened.

UNIVERSITY GLEE CLUB WEDNESDAY

Revision of the itinerary of the University of Oregon Glee club will bring that group of singers and stunt-producers to Medford Wednesday, March 26, and in Ashland on the following evening in the course of the twentieth annual tour.

The club, reorganized and strengthened, has been practicing for two months on the program to be given on this tour. Besides the usual chorus and solo work, a program of stunts has been worked out, the nature of which is kept secret at the university, since the home concert is not to be given this year until after the club has been on the road. The organization is directed by John Stark Evans, of the faculty of the School of Music, who returned to his work here three months ago after winning a commission in the army. He was discharged at Camp Lewis after the signing of the armistice.

DOWLING CONSECRATED ARCHBISHOP OF ST. PAUL

ST. PAUL, Minn., March 25.—The most Rev. Austin Dowling, former Roman Catholic bishop of the Des Moines diocese, was today consecrated archbishop of St. Paul in succession to John Ireland, who died several months ago.

GERMANS RETAIN DIVISIONAL STAFF ARMY ORGANIZATION

COBLENZ.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—There is no longer any set standard for the strength of a division in the German army, say American experts. This is regarded as important in view of the fact that delegates at the peace conference not long ago suggested that the German army be limited to six divisions.

At the beginning of the war a German division comprised about 16,000 men. In the latter part of the war the divisions consisted of three infantry and one artillery regiments, with pioneers, signalmen and various other technical troops numbering approximately 9,000 men. At present, it is declared, no division in the German army has 5,000 men and they are probably divisions with less than 1000 men.

In demobilization it has obviously been the policy to make the regiment the prime unit but to retain in existence all divisional staffs of divisions which existed in July, 1914.

It is probable, according to the experts with the American army of occupation, that there still exists in the German army 100 or more divisional staffs in more or less skeleton forms. These divisions are "demobilized" but not dissolved. Apparently it has been the purpose to retain a considerable number of staffs in skeleton form until the future of the German army is definitely decided by the National Assembly in Weimar.

Taking these facts into consideration, the American officers who have made a careful study of the demobilization of the German army as well as all other activities of the enemy troops say that the term division in connection with the present German army has no standard meaning. In connection with the future army of Germany the Americans assert that the term division requires a defining clause such as a "division on pre-war establishment" or a division on establishment basis existing November 11, 1918.

MYSTERY BULLET SLAYS DAUGHTER OF MAJOR

SAN FRANCISCO, March 25.—Sallie Swift, 12-year-old daughter of Major and Mrs. Eugene L. Swift, was killed by a mystery bullet last Saturday afternoon as she stood dressing before an open window of her home at the Presidio here, where her father is stationed.

This announcement was made last night by military authorities. A comprehensive search by military investigators brought no clue as to the source of the bullet, according to the statement.

STATE ENGINEER PROBES TEEL IRRIGATION PROJECT

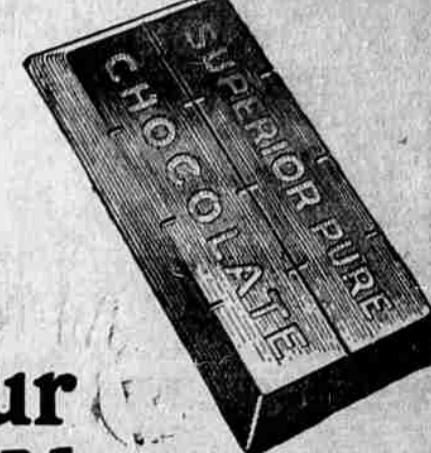
