It will cost more to send telegrams after April 1st, when the increased war revenue tax goes into effect. While there has been a war tax of five cents on all messages costing 15 cents and over, the new rate is 10 cents on all messages costing more than 50 cents to send and five cents on messages costing from 15 to 50 cents. The war tax will be collected at the sending office when the message is prepaid, and will be paid by the person to whom it is sent when it is "collected" except to points outside of the United States, when the sender must pay the tax.

GERMAN U-BOATS FOR LOAN CAMPAIGN

WASHINGTON, March 28.—Five surrendered German submarines will leave England tomorrow for the United States manned by American crews and conveyed by the American submarine tender Bushnell. They are expected to arrive in American waters late in April and will be displayed at ports to be selected in connection with the Liberty loan campaign.

WASHINGTON, March 28.—Six thousand Belgian civilians died during the war as the result of German ill treatment, according to an official report made in the chamber of deputies Thursday. Seven thousand children were made orphans and 125,000 men were deported from Belgium by the Germans.

The indemnity which can be claimed by Belgium on this account is estimated at 900,000,000 francs.

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BISHOP SUMNER TO VISIT MEDFORD

The Rt. Rev. Walter T. Sumner, D. D., bishop of Oregon, will be at St. Marks' church on Sunday evening, and preach and confirm a class.

Bishop Sumner was a great friend and admirer of the late Theodore Roosevelt, and was a frequent guest at Oyster Bay.

The bishop gained a nation-wide reputation by his social work at the cathedral in Chicago; and was one of the commission of social reconstruction in that city, whose report, issued under the auspices of the Chicago vice commission, was made the text book of social reform in so many cities. He is widely known and sought as a lecturer on the prevailing topics of national and civic improvement.

BRITISH EMBARGO ON SALMON LIFTED

LONDON, Mar. 28.—In order that canned goods importers and distributors may take the necessary steps for purchasing their supplies of the 1919 pack of American and Canadian canned salmon, the food controller announces that it is not his present intention to purchase this pack or requisition the supplies on arrival in England. If, however, circumstances render it necessary, maximum prices may be imposed for the sale of this salmon.
