

HOGS JUMP UP OVER \$20 AGAIN

CHICAGO, APRIL 1.—Hog prices passed the \$20 mark upward bound today when they were quoted at \$20.10 per hundred at the stockyards. The highest war-time price was \$21 last fall. During the winter prices dropped slightly under \$18, but have been advancing since the government minimum price guarantee was taken off nearly a month ago. At the United States bureau of markets this recent advance was ascribed to heavy demand coupled with the fact that the winter run of hogs was largely shipped out during the winter leaving the supply comparatively light until the new run of hogs begins in May or June.
