ANTI-JAP BILLS ARE INTRODUCED AT SACRAMENTO

SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 2.—Two bills and a resolution affecting the interests of Japanese were placed before the California state senate today. Senator Inman asked permission to introduce a bill which would amend the California anti-alien land law to prevent Japanese leasing agricultural land in this state.

He also introduced a joint resolution urging American delegates to the peace conference to provide in the League of Nations covenant "that the several nations also themselves shall control the subject of immigration and exercise discrimination as they see fit to preserve their population."

The resolution called attention to a proposal of Japanese delegates to the conference for "free immigration" and declared that "the free coming of non-assimilable Orientals would exterminate or destroy the white population of California and the Pacific coast."

Permission to introduce a bill aimed at the "Japanese picture brides" was asked by Senator Duncan. His proposed bill would amend the California marriage laws to make this state refuse to recognize a picture bride as a wife.

HYATT—Died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. D. Wylie, 328 Dakota avenue, at 2:30 p. m., April 1, 1919, of old age and general debility, W. G. Hyatt. He was born at West Camden, New York, Feb. 9, 1832, being 86 years, one month and 28 days old. In 1858 he was united in marriage to Miss Maria Reese. To

this union were born nine children of whom five survive; Mrs. S. W. Harper, Grant City, Mo.; Mrs. Geo. Zoltes and Fred G. Hyatt, St. James, Minn.; Mrs. J. F. Cole, Roseburg, Ore.; and Mrs. J. D. Wylie of Medford. He came with his wife from St. James, Minn., to Medford six years ago. Six months after their coming his wife died and since that time he has made his home with his daughter, Mrs. J. D. Wylie.

He was a member of the First Baptist church of St. James, Minn., of which church he was for many years a deacon. He was ever trustful and dutiful to his Heavenly Father, always endeavoring to be useful to his fellow men, his daily prayer being "God help me to do right." His whole life was a sermon of the highest type and he was loved and appreciated by all who knew him.

The funeral services were held at the Baptist church at 2 p. m. Wednesday, conducted by the pastor, Rev. W. T. S. Spriggs.

His remains and those of his wife will be sent their old home St. James, Minn., for burial.
