An Ordinance regulating Public Dances within the City of Medford

Dances within the City of Medford and requiring a license therefor.

THE CITY OF MEDFORD DOTH ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:
Section 1. The term "Public Dance" is hereby defined, for the purpose of this ordinance, to be any dance which shall be held or conducted for compensation, paid directly or indirectly to the owner, proprietor, mannger or operator thereof.
Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to hold any public dance,
