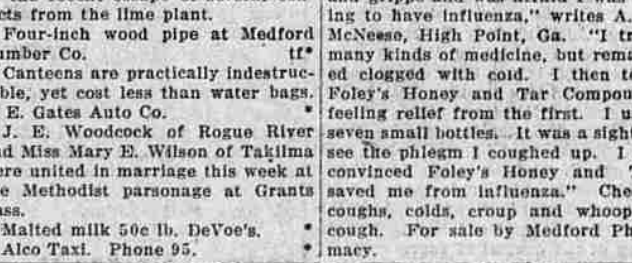

ELKS MINSTREL SHOW IS FEATURE OF NEXT WEEK

The Medford Elks lodge, which during the war refrained entirely from holding any benefits of any kind but gave constantly to all patriotic causes, will break the long fast next week by giving a big minstrel show at the Page theater on Wednesday and Thursday nights, which they say will merit a large public patronage. The Elks have been rehearsing for weeks and the performance has already reached a satisfactory condition for public presentation, but will be constantly bettered, if possible, up to the hour of the first performance.

The tickets are selling fast and reports from neighboring cities and towns point to a large outside attendance. A feature of the opening night will be the first appearance of the new city band, which will give a half hour's concert in front of the theater. A big feature of the show itself, both nights, will be the appearance of Herbert Launsbach's nine-piece jazz orchestra. The word jazz is the motto of the Elks minstrel show.

The musical numbers of the show include all the popular songs with a guarantee of harmony singers second to none on the Pacific coast. The directors of the show report that a number of vaudeville acts equal to any to be found on the regular circuits will be staged, and that the people of Medford to appreciate what is in store must be present on Wednesday or Thursday nights, or both.

The four end men, Jerry Johnson Jerome, Quiz Dockstader, Quilzenberry, Vern Wavter Van and George Primrose Collins, will be the chief dispensers of mirth and "funnybone fizz." Their repertoire will include all the latest jokes, gags, etc., and with George T. Wilson, the popular producer of minstrel shows, who is well known all over the coast, as interlocutor.

The publicity committee in conjunction with Dr. Page, manager of the theater, is working hard and by Monday the city and vicinity will be billed for the coming show like a circus.

EXAMINATION FOR FOREST CLERK MEDFORD APRIL 9

The United States Civil Service Commission announces that a forest and field clerk examination will be held in this city on April 9, 1919, to fill vacancies in the position of forest clerk, forest service, and clerk in the reclamation and other field services of the government service throughout the Eleventh Civil Service district (Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming and Alaska).

The entrance salary for the position of forest clerk is \$1,100 and \$1,200 a year; for the position of clerk in the reclamation and other services, \$1,100 and \$1,400 a year. Age limits for forest clerk, 18 to 40 years; for field clerk, 18 years or over. Both men and women will be admitted to the examination.

RUNS RAILWAYS OF SIBERIA

Stevens is to manage the Siberian railroad system for inter-allied commission. He was sent to Russia by the United States at the head of a commission of railroad men to reorganize the entire Russian railway system, but they were stopped in their work by the rise of the Bolsheviks and retired to Japan. Stevens is a Boston man and proved his ability as a member of a board of trustees appointed to administer affairs of the Boston Elevated railway on service-cost plan.

NEW WAR RELICS TO BE EXHIBITED

Of the many war relics of various kinds seen in Medford in the past few weeks the most interesting yet will be on exhibition in the Model Clothing store show window next week. It is a German flag taken from a German trench during the battle of Chateau Thierry by William D. Herron, the Croix de Guerre with palm decoration marines hero of Gold Hill.

The dirty and blood bespattered flag, from its appearance could no doubt tell a thrilling tale of mortal combat between men in the trenches if it could talk. Blood spots are all over it, and in the main body of the flag is the bloody imprint of a bare foot.

J. W. Herron, the Gold Hill merchant and father of the young hero, who has resumed his service in the marines, was here Friday afternoon with the interesting collection of war relics he has brought home from France, and making arrangements for its exhibition.

FIRST SOLDIER IN OREGON REQUESTS HIS LAND GRANT

SALEM, April 5.—The distinction of being the first soldier to have his name presented to the new Oregon land settlement commission will probably fall to Sergeant George L. Tuel, who is now serving in a clerical position with the American commission to negotiate peace, sitting in Paris. In a letter to Governor Olcott received today, Sergeant Tuel says that when he is discharged and returns to the United States he desires to get back to the land, and tells the governor that the latter will be doing the soldier a great favor if he can help in giving a start on a farm. Governor Olcott will refer the request to the land settlement commission, which will meet in Salem in the near future for organization. Under the land settlement act, soldiers and marines are given preferences over others.

FIVE CARS OF WOUNDED MEN ARRIVE AT TACOMA

TACOMA, Wash., April 5.—Included in the 380 men who arrived in Camp Lewis for discharge last night and today were five hospital cars which arrived in one train, with 125 wounded men, all of whom were taken on at once to the base hospital. The train arrived at 11 a. m. There were six litter cases in the detachments. Most of the number came from debarkation hospital No. 3, New York.
