LIGHT FROST BUT NO DAMAGE TO FRUIT REPORTED

Along with the frost early this morning came the first smudging of a number of orchards for the season, and fears are entertained by many orchardists, in view of the weather prediction of a very heavy frost tomorrow morning. Local weather conditions today made the outlook favorable for a heavy frost, and the orchard men were busy getting things all ready to fire up the smudge pots early if necessary.

This morning's frost did not do much damage. It was thought at County Agent Cate's office, in the absence of complete information from all parts of the valley. Mr. Cate started out this afternoon to make a cursory investigation of the situation.

The minimum temperature in Medford and immediate vicinity was 29 degrees above, which was exactly the minimum predicted at 7 o'clock Sunday night by Frost Expert Young. In other parts of the valley, notably the northern section, it was thought the temperature was a degree or two lower.

Both County Agent Cate and Frost Expert Young this noon deemed the frost damage done as slight, and pointed out that in view of the heavily loaded trees many buds could be frost-bitten without affecting the general crop. Not in many years has there been prospects of so large a crop in the orchards. Many of the enthusiasts predict a crop of 2500 cars, but a heavy frost would put a damper on this outlook.

Only a few orchards smudged this morning including the Bear Creek and Kenly orchards.
