

Y. M. C. A. DRIVE IN JACKSON COUNTY STARTS JUNE 9TH

"The convention held last week in Portland took a long step in advance along reconstruction lines," said Walter Fraser Brown on his return home today from Portland where he attended the 19th annual Oregon-Idaho interstate convention of the Y. M. C. A.

"It is a recognizable fact that a very much larger proportion of the boys and young men live in the country districts than do in the municipal centers. County work is not a new departure with the association, but the new conditions which the world war has brought upon us, together with the fact just mentioned which has been growing upon them, has led the association to press with more vigor than ever before, the establishment of their work throughout the counties.

"Oregon and Idaho have been divided into six districts, three in each state, excluding Portland, which makes the seventh district by itself. A budget of \$45,200 has been settled upon as the amount required to finance this undertaking for 1919-20. The quota of \$5550 has been assigned to district No. 1, which is southwestern Oregon, comprising the counties of Lake, Klamath, Jackson, Josephine, Douglas, Coos, Curry, Lane, Linn, Benton and Lincoln. Of this amount Jackson county is expected to raise \$675. The week of June 2d to June 9th has been set apart to make this drive and it is the sanguine expectation of the 150 delegates in attendance upon the convention that the hopes of the association will be realized.

"It is in the mind of association leaders, and the idea has received strong support from all right-thinking people to whose attention it has been brought, that so far as possible the same opportunities should be opened up to the boy in the country, as is now afforded those in the large cities, for other things being equal, the average merchant of today, controlling a large business, considers with greater favor the boy brought up in rural communities than he does him who is encompassed by urban advantages."

There was a large attendance and a number of Medford people were guests, receiving a very cordial welcome from the Central Point people. Smith responded for the Medford church, and complimented the congregation at Central Point on the splendid new life they have taken on since Mr. Millard has been preaching for them on Wednesday evenings. Mr. Millard explained the budget for the church this year and said he had no doubt of the members reaching the goal. The budget was adopted.

After the program splendid refreshments were served, a special feature being the large number of delicious cakes.

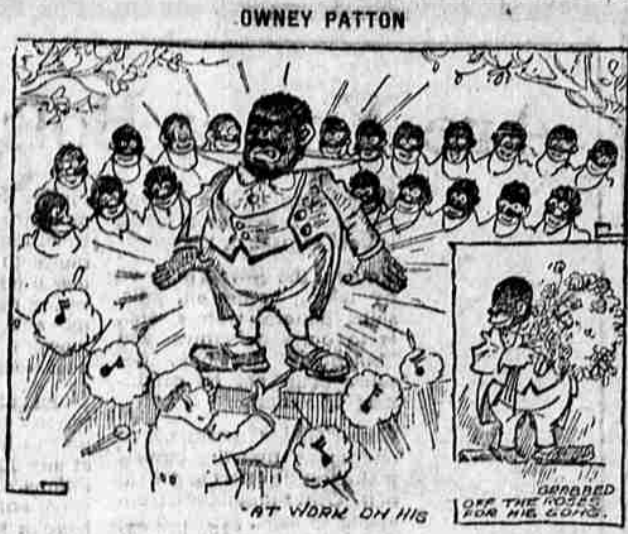

START FREE LOVE CAMPAIGN ALONG THE PACIFIC COAST

SPOKANE, Wash., April 8.—A letter which they found in the possession of Harry M. Weeks of Portland, under arrest here on a charge of disloyalty and charged with violation of the Mann act, and which refers to a meeting of the "C. C. C." was made public by the police today. These letters were signed to threatening letters received by Governor Stephens of California shortly before the executive mansion at Sacramento was damaged by an explosion several months ago.

The letter, addressed to John Keracher of Detroit, deals mainly with the question of free love, and declares that the writer plans a campaign here and on the coast, that the "sex struggle may be revived," it says:

"Your telegram received and I wired you to send us 1000 copies of 'The Proletarian.' We will remit check as soon as we have the next meeting of the C. C. C. so the bill can be allowed."

The federal officials are investigating the letter and the activities it discusses, it was stated.
