

CHOOSE LANDING SITES FOR STATE FOREST AIRSHIPS

SALEM, April 9.—In connection with the reported request of District Forester Cecil of Portland for a fleet of airplanes from the war department for use in patrolling the national forests of Oregon, it was stated today that the airplanes, if secured would be used only during the summer months and would give notice in case of forest fires.

It is understood that tentative landing sites for the planes are now under consideration in the event that the war department grants the forester's request. The district forester would not attempt to secure landing space in the mountain regions, but would have the planes start upon their scout duty in the mountain ranges from the nearest possible locality where the planes could be landed and started.
