

# WHIPPET TANK IN CITY ON THURSDAY MORNING AT 9:30

Another war relic treat is in store for the people of Medford and all those persons who desire to see a war tank in action should be down town at 9:30 a. m. tomorrow when their desire will be gratified.

A French whippet tank, which saw service in France, making a tour thru the state as a part of the Victory loan campaign will arrive in the city from Ashland at 9:30 a. m. in charge of several soldiers and after being run over the downtown streets will stop at the Nash hotel or some other prominent corner, where after several four-minute talks have been given by local orators will proceed on its way upstate.

The tank will be in charge of C. Clarence Likens, the Portland overseas veteran who won fame and a Croix de Guerre with a palm for distinguished service in France. He will demonstrate the tank and answer all questions. Likens, it will be remembered, was the soldier in charge of the tank on the war relics train during its recent visit here.

He went over the top three days in succession at the battle of the Argonne in an exactly similar tank and each day the driver of the tank was killed and he had to pull his body out of the tank. On the evening of the fourth day a German shell struck the tank, killing the driver and badly wounding Likens. He suffered a broken leg and dislocated shoulder and was also gassed.

The next stop after leaving Medford tomorrow will be at Central Point which will be reached, it is expected, some time in the early afternoon. The tank will arrive today in Ashland, having been shipped from California.

officials, the proponents of that system, but laying down 12 conditions, including a dictatorship of the proletariat, introduction of general labor duty for the bourgeoisie, reconstruction of courts on a revolutionary basis, reconstruction of the dwelling system, the separation of the church and state, socialization of the press and creation of a Red army alliance with Russia and Hungary.

The council has accepted these conditions, so the independent socialists are supporting the soviet plan, but their leader, Dr. Levin believes the present council fails to represent the proletariat and that the basic idea of the council has been strangled. The majority socialists in South Bavaria have gone utterly to pieces and are wholly at outs with those in North Bavaria.

PARIS, April 9.—A general strike has been proclaimed in Berlin and the suburbs of Handau, advices received here say. Herr Noske, the minister of defense, is reported to have concentrated thirty thousand loyal troops at the gates of Berlin for use in case of trouble.

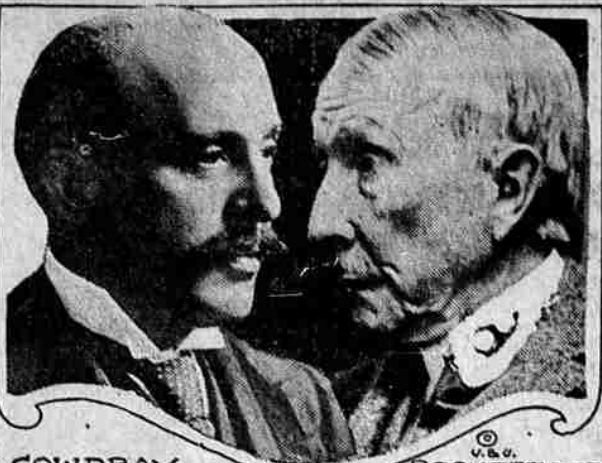
## NEW ARCHBISHOP

## THERE'S NEW OIL KING RULING

Back of the announcement from London that the British government is going into the oil business and has made a close alliance with the Royal Dutch Shell interests in one of the most remarkable romances of commercial history and one of the most important developments of recent time.

The London announcement simply means that the British have determined to control oil so far as it is possible for them to do so. In carrying out their plans, they will have the services of H. A. W. Deterding, the master spirit of the Royal Dutch Shell, the man who threatens to out-Rockefeller Rockefeller.

Incidentally Lord Cowdray, who up to the present time has been the leading light in oil circles in the British empire, gets out His holdings in the Mexican and other fields being taken over by the Royal Dutch Shell.

Deterding is a Dutchman, born in Amsterdam. Unless there is some radical change in the situation, it is the confident prediction that Deterding will become a greater oil king within the next 10 or 15 years than Rockefeller was at the height of his power. There are likely to be very big developments in oil within the next few years, and America is deeply concerned in what happens.

## PARIS SAYS PEACE CONFERENCE CAN'T TALK MUCH MORE

PARIS, April 9.—The council of four met this morning. The questions of responsibility for the war and the disposition of the Saar valley again were under discussion by Premiers Lloyd George, Clemenceau and Orlando and President Wilson.

## START RECRUITING CAMPAIGN ALONG THE PACIFIC COAST

TACOMA, April 9.—In order to assist the government in raising 500,000 volunteers to replace soldiers in the army at present, 35 men and two officers from Camp Lewis start this week on a recruiting campaign over the northwest it was announced at Camp Lewis this morning.

The party will travel in motor trucks and carry their own equipment, including tentage. Wherever they stop they will set up a model camp.

The equipment carried will include a five ton armored artillery tractor drawing a 75 m. m. gun, timber and caisson with the gun's fire control apparatus; one tank truck, two ammunition trucks, one signal radio truck and apparatus, one mobile artillery truck, two ambulance trucks, one rolling kitchen, two trucks for rations, and one automobile for the officers.
