WANT 15,000 MEN FOR U.S. AIR SERVICE

SAN FRANCISCO, April 11.—Authority has just been granted by the general staff of the army for the enlistment of about 15,000 men into the air service. This presents an unusual opportunity for those who desire to become identified with what is probably the most talked of and fascinating branch of military service; and it is a foregone conclusion that the quota will soon be filled. Enlistment is for one or three year periods.

The air service has a mechanical instruction school in operation at the present time and is about to establish others.

The apparent disparity between pay of civilians and pay of enlisted men in the army, at the first glance seems to be in favor of the civilian, whereas, as a matter of fact, if the question were analyzed closely, the average pay of the enlisted man compares very favorably with that of the civilian.
