

### BOY TRIES JOY RIDE WITH MILK WAGON STEED

Clifford Snyder, the 14 year old Washington school boy who has been sent to a state school for correction twice, is in trouble again and in the hands of the authorities because of his fondness for joyriding.

The lad's latest escapade was the driving of a saddle horse, belonging to Chas. Hoover, the dairyman, nearly to death. Thursday morning Mr. Hoover left his horse near a Bear creek pasture to look over some cattle he had grazing there, and in his absence the Snyder boy, who was playing hooky from school, wandered along, mounted the horse and galloped away.

Mr. Hoover as soon as he discovered the absence of the horse and learned that a boy had driven the animal away hurriedly got an automobile and started in pursuit. He finally came upon young Snyder between Medford and Engle Point. The horse was nearly dead. Sheriff Terwiller took the boy into custody and he will be arraigned before the juvenile court.

### ROBBERS GRAB 150 CASES OF BOOZE

BUTTE, Mont., April 12.—Special officers in the employ of the county attorney today seized 150 cases of bonded whiskey, together with several cases of other liquors and champagne of an aggregate estimated value of \$15,000.

The liquor was stored in a house here from where it was said to have been stolen last night after the caretaker and his wife had been seized and bound. Today it was traced to the basement of a business block and removed to the court house.

One man has been arrested on suspicion of having knowledge of the robbery and it is expected that other arrests will follow.

### FEDERAL LEAGUE IS GIVEN DAMAGES

WASHINGTON, April 12.—A verdict for the plaintiff with damages fixed at \$80,000 was returned late today by the jury in the suit of the Baltimore Federal league club against the American and National leagues and certain officers of the defunct Federal league. As the suit was brought under the Sherman anti-trust law, the damages will be trebled, making the amount \$240,000, if a final judgment is entered.

### SABLE CAPE WORTH \$4,500 LOST ABOARD C. P. SHIP

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 12.—Reports have been made to Vancouver police that clothing and other goods worth \$7,500 were stolen from the baggage of A. Lillian Atkins aboard the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Russia during the vessel's recent voyage between the Orient and Vancouver. A sable cape valued at \$4,500 and an ermine cape valued at \$300 were reported among the goods lost.

### SECRETARY LANE REQUESTS MEN TO AID SOLDIERS

WASHINGTON, April 12.—Fifteen thousand employees of the department of the interior in bureaus throughout the country were requested today by Secretary Lane to make every effort to aid returning soldiers, sailors and marines to obtain work. The employees were directed to report all opportunities for employment to Colonel Arthur Woods, special assistant to the secretary of war in employment of discharged soldiers.

### GERMANY NOW THREATENED BY RAILROAD TIE UP

BERLIN, April 11.—(Via Copenhagen.)—The railway management at Cassel announced today that because of lack of coal through the miners' strike in the Ruhr region, a large number of passenger trains had to be cancelled today. There is danger of a complete cessation of railway traffic, the announcement added.

PARIS, April 12.—The text of the league of nations covenant will be made public in a few days, says the official announcement of the league of nations commission regarding last night's session. Except for the technical task of bringing the French and English texts into accord with the covenant, the announcement states, it is ready for the plenary session of the peace conference.

### GOLD HILL ADOPTS MEDFORD'S DANCE HALL REGULATIONS

GOLD HILL.—(Special). The city council of Gold Hill at their last regular session adopted the dance ordinance on the same lines as those recently adopted at Medford and other valley towns. It requires the attendance of a matron with full police power at all public dances, and requires that all patrons be over the age of eighteen years unless accompanied by at least one parent or legal guardian. It made no change in the amount of the license for public dances, but gives the police more power in regulating the conduct of the attendants in dance halls and increases the fines and penalties for use of intoxicating beverages on the premises or in the city in accordance with the state law regulating the use and traffic in intoxicating liquors. Gold Hill has the largest open air pavilion in southern Oregon which has become very popular all over this county and Josephine the past several years. It is owned and managed by the Commercial club of Gold Hill, which has never experienced any trouble in keeping good order, but feel that the restriction placed on the dances by the new ordinance would be in keeping with the policy of the other cities in the valley and increase the popularity of the resort. With the homecoming of several of the band boys from France the Gold Hill band with its twenty or more uniformed members have again become an active organization and will add to the popularity of Gold Hill the coming season as a summer resort with the band's popular evening concerts.

Japan Sends Troops

"Under these circumstances no one expects that the military forces will remain supine. If the government allows the riots to take their course, the outrages will not only increase but the movement will eventually ally itself with Bolshevism which now controls the greater part of Siberia to which Korea is adjacent.

"Infected by this situation, the Japanese government has now decided to send to Korea a military contingent consisting of six companies and four hundred gendarmes, hoping thereby to restore order and bring back prosperity to the people as soon as possible."

### COL. LEADER TO SPEAK AT PAGE TUESDAY NIGHT

Colonel John Leader of the University of Oregon, comes to the Page theater Tuesday evening, April 15, under the auspices of the Wednesday Study club. He will tell of his experiences in the Battle of the Somme. Those who have heard Col. Leader say that he reminds them very much of Lieutenant McQuarrie who spoke before a large audience here several months ago. At the outbreak of the present war he recruited a regiment in Ireland which he trained and officered with cadets whom he also trained, and led to France, where, as a part of the famous Ulster division, it was fairly wiped out in the early days of the Somme, in an action which has been characterized as the greatest deed of the war. Colonel Leader was himself broken down by the campaign and pronounced unfit for further active war service. He came to this country and during the war helped train officers for our army. He is now military instructor and teacher of history at the University of Oregon. The lectures will immediately follow the first show, about 8:40.
