

CHAIRMAN HAYS URGES REPUBLICANS TO SUPPORT LOAN

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Chairman Will H. Hays, of the republican national committee, today issued a call to all republicans urging their united and effective support of the Victory loan. While the call is publicly issued to all republicans, it was also sent directly and personally to all republican national committeemen, state chairmen, all state organization workers, all county chairmen and all precinct committeemen and to all republican newspapers, asking them to suspend all political activities until the success of the loan has been assured.

The text of the appeal reads: To the republicans of the nation: Again the call for the charge has sounded.

This is not for the fighting men at the fighting front. For them the war is over. Their part is accomplished to their everlasting honor and the glory of the nation, and no additional burden should be theirs.

But to the rest the real test has come.

To those whose privilege it has been to form the second line, and to whose credit it is recorded that they, too, attained every objective; to those from every class, creed and political faith, who acted in that unselfish cooperation which brought to the fighting men the support that made so much for the complete vindication of our institutions; to the men and women of America, who do not fail, has this call come.

Let us show to these fighting men who have returned how commands have been obeyed here. Let us send to the fighting men still abroad the message of no weakening. Let us show to the world that our patriotism is not that born only of extremities and stirred only by martial music, but the devotion which meets a duty in the firm determination of consecrated service, and performs it. And let us demonstrate to ourselves that we are worthy of the name American and the privileges of our citizenship.

Our first duty as republicans today is that duty which we have never failed and never will fail to anticipate and discharge—our duty as Americans. Just as during the recent war we determined our every act by how we could do most for effective action, so now we will measure our every step by how we can contribute most to the nation's welfare.

To that end we will abandon all other activities to aid in the Victory loan until its success has been accomplished.

For this purpose let the republican press and every member of the republican organization enlist in the Victory loan drive. The national, state, county, city and precinct organization of loyal working republicans will enroll to a man in this service.

This is the nation's next great duty, it is our privilege to exhaust the possibilities in our same splendid support, with the knowledge that those who may oppose us in political strife are joining fully with us in this effort.

SOLDIER WANTED FOR THEFT IS SUICIDE

SAN JOSE, Calif., April 15.—W. W. Scott, wearing the uniform of a sergeant in the artillery corps, shot and instantly killed himself early this morning in a hotel room when two policemen searching for him broke down the door. Scott had descended by a drain pipe from the floor above when police demanded admittance. Cries for help from the floor below brought the police, who entered the unlighted room. One shot was fired at them searching their faces. After a second shot Scott was found dead, shot through the head.

W. H. Brown, occupant of the room where the tragedy occurred, said Scott entered his window and threatened him if he betrayed his presence. Scott was identified by the police through his signature on a hotel register and a card giving the address of Mrs. M. Scott, 1382 Twenty-second street, San Francisco. The police sought him in connection with unexplained thefts in hotels here.

ITALIAN SYNDICATE TO DEVELOP CHILEAN TRADE

SANTIAGO, Chile, April 14.—An Italian syndicate is being organized here with a capital of 10,000,000 lire. Its object is to develop Chilean-Italian commerce and its operations will probably be extended to Peru, Bolivia and Ecuador.

SEATTLE COPS ARRESTED STEAL 3000 QUARTS

SEATTLE, April 15.—Two Seattle police, Sergeant Gus V. Hasselblad and Patrolman W. F. Patton were arrested today by federal officers and charged with the theft of liquor worth about \$30,000 from the United States customs appraisers' stores here March 31. Arresting officers said the men backed a truck up to the door and carried away about 3,000 quarts.

East River Subway Opens.

NEW YORK, April 15.—Without formal ceremonies the new Clark street tunnel under the East river, connecting the Seventh Ave. subway with Brooklyn, was opened today. Construction of the tunnel, which cost \$7,000,000, was begun in October, 1914.

CIVILIZED WORLD MUST UNITE SAYS GRAND DUKE ALEX

PARIS, April 16.—(Correspondence of Associated Press.) A world wide campaign of civilization against Bolshevism is earnestly advocated by the former Grand Duke Alexander Michaelovitch, brother-in-law of the former Emperor Nicholas of Russia, who is in Paris, he says, to tell the truth about Russia. The former grand duke, who was for a time kept prisoner in Crimea by the Bolsheviks, urges that representatives of neutral nations should be invited to attend the peace conference to decide upon means of fighting "the danger threatening the stability of the universe."

To a correspondent of the Associated Press, the former grand duke said: Bolshevism is an evil force which attacks the world, ruins civilization, culture and all the moral laws. The present chaos and suffering in Russia is today a striking and living illustration of what may be in store for any country which permits Bolshevism and the lawless principles for which it stands to obtain a foothold within its borders. To everybody it is clear that the world must use all means to stop the spread of this poisonous disease. It is the sacred right of the peoples of each and every country to be warned and defended by their governments. They must not be led astray by false promises which lawlessness and disorder can never fulfill.

The organized forces of established order must be set up as a bulwark, utilized as an instrument against the tyranny of the formidable forces of disruption and anarchy. The answer to Bolshevism is a firm and decided stand against it. In order, however, to achieve success combined and coordinated action on the part of civilized nations is essential.

The present offers an exceptionally favorable opportunity for initiating and organizing this campaign. Now assembled in Paris are the representative statesmen of the world. Their mission is to establish a lasting peace. But such a peace, no matter how ardently and universally desired is impossible of attainment so long as the moral and social, the industrial and political fabrics of all civilized countries are threatened with upheaval, overthrow and destruction by the volcanic forces of Bolshevism. To blind ourselves to this fact would be criminal folly.

Advantage should be taken of the presence of the peace conference for the express purpose of reviewing the danger threatening the stability of the universe, of probing the difficulties it presents, and of deciding upon the best means to adopt to avert the threatened catastrophe. Certain tentative decisions have, I believe, already been arrived at by the great powers in regard to help policy for counter-acting the work and influence of Bolshevik propagandists in their respective states. But the Bolshevik peril is not local or national or even continental; it is world-wide in its scope and menace. Frontiers offer no bulwark to its advances, oceans do not hinder its expansion.

HUNS PAY A MILLION MARKS FOR FOOD

COBLENZ, Sunday, April 13.—(By Associated Press.) Seven million marks were deposited Saturday at headquarters for the Third Army by the Germans to pay for food supplies for civilians in the area occupied by the United States forces. During the last week nine million marks were deposited for this purpose by the Germans.

The first food train started from France this morning, its cars being loaded from American army depots. The first shipments have been sent to Treves, Coblenz, Neuwied and Montabaur and distributed thruout the district at uniform prices fixed by the German government.

TROTSKY ADMITS DEFEAT ON THE EASTERN FRONT

LONDON, April 15.—Leon Trotsky, Bolshevik minister of war and marine of Russia, admits defeat on the eastern front in a wireless message from Moscow which has been picked up here. The message reads: "All our efforts now must be directed to the eastern front which is the only front upon which we have suffered defeats. We must send old and experienced troops to that quarter. It is absolutely necessary for us to capture Ekaterinburg, Perm and Ufa."
