PUT OVER THE P. & E.

NOW lets get behind this P. and E. proposition and put it over. A little of the old Medford spirit can do the trick. And it must be done, if that old Medford spirit is to survive.

Medford faces a crisis. The war is over. Peace has come. Hundreds of discharged soldiers have returned. Hundreds of new people have come in. Business is good, crop prospects are excellent, real estate has not been so active in many moons.

But the returned soldiers, the strangers, are waiting to see which way Medford is going. There is a better feeling, but they want to be shown. Lets show them by getting behind this railroad and establishing pay rolls, starting up the lumber mills again, and keeping one of our strongest permanent assets, and one of the strongest promises of permanent prosperity where it belongs.

A few years ago Medford bonded itself by an overwhelming majority for a railroad to the coast. The road was not surveyed, its route was not known, its markets and tonnage still had to be developed, the immediate prosperity of none of our citizens depended upon it. Moreover no interest to be benefitted offered to put up a penny. But the proposition went over the top a whooping and only legal obstructions knocked it out. That was the Medford spirit.

Here we have a railroad already built. Its markets are established. A new and favorable freight rate has been allowed. The tonnage is here merely waiting for the wheels to turn. We have the word of reliable business men that the road can be operated at a profit. If it is not operated one thriving community tributary to Medford will be wiped off the map, two of our principal local industries will be forced to suspend, and the fact will be advertised to the world that Medford has quit.

Moreover, the people of Medford are not asked to finance this proposition alone. Half of the necessary \$60,000 is contributed by one of the large timber concerns interested. The local industries affected are contributing in proportion to their self interest. All that the people are asked to do is to contribute their just share.

Another point. The P. and E. is merely a feeder, a beginning without an end. But once let the P. and E. disappear and Medford's chance of ever having a coast or direct eastern railroad outlet is gone. On the other hand as long as the P. and E. remains, that hope remains. In other words the P. and E. in operation will act as a constant magnet for a through connection with the Steamboat road on one hand, and the California coast road on the other. And once effect these connections and Medford's future growth and prosperity are secure.

The Victory loan drive comes next week. The Pacific and Eastern drive this week. There need be no conflict between the two. Medford's quota has been reduced so that merely a duplication of former efforts will see both drives well over the top.

Prospects were never brighter. Let's strike while the iron is hot demonstrating not only to the outside world but to ourselves that Medford has come back and come back strong.

CHARGE MISSIONARIES WITH PRO-GERMANISM

I would be glad if you would make some mention of this in your paper so that old residents of your vicinity might send in such information as they might have from personal recollection. These might either be forwarded direct to me or collected by you and then transmitted. I shall

appreciate very much any trouble that you take in this matter and I assure you that the matter is of greater importance than it would at first seem to be to the layman.

PASSIVE RESISTANCE SPREADS TO INDIA

LONDON, Monday, April 14.—Spread of disturbances in India was referred to in parliament tonight as being the outcome of a "passive resistance" movement against recent Indian legislation known as the Rowlett act, intended to combat seditious conspiracy.

The movement originated with the home rule element in Bombay and has taken shape in attacks on officials and Europeans and on property. The India office tonight issued a long statement describing the general situation and concluded by saying that in most of the places military forces are maintaining order.

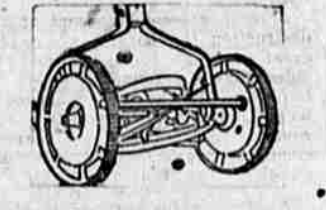
