

MEDFORD TEAMS IN VICTORY DRIVE ARE ANNOUNCED

With preparations for the Victory Loan campaign in the Medford district practically completed this afternoon, but little remains to be done until Monday when the monster street parade will officially start the drive. The organization throughout the county was never more thorough and systematically arranged than for the present campaign and no detail has been overlooked in order to facilitate the work of the soliciting teams.

The big parade will start promptly at 4:15 Monday afternoon, and promises to be as large as any previous demonstration of the kind held in Medford. Scout Master Paul Janney, who with the Boy Scouts will conduct the parade, will announce the definite places of assembly for the various units and the line of march tomorrow.

Probably the most prominent feature of the parade will be the unit composed of the returned soldiers and sailors who have been requested to participate in the parade in uniform. This unit will be in command of Captain Ralph Cowgill and will assemble at 4 o'clock at the band stand in the city park.

PORTLAND, April 18.—Dr. William Tyler Smith, contestant of the \$600,000 will of Xarifa Jane Falings, his cousin, who died in August, 1917, leaving the bulk of the vast estate to C. Lewis Mead and Thomas N. Strong, died at his home at Sheridan, Ore., early yesterday morning.

Dr. William Tyler Smith began the contest of Mrs. Falings' will immediately after her death in 1917. The bitter fight ended several months ago and the case in a swiftness decision by County Judge Taxwell.

COMPLETE PLANS EASTER EGG HUNT IN PARK SATURDAY

All plans for the big Easter egg hunt on Saturday are completed, and interest is growing hourly. At exactly the stroke of 12, on Saturday the park and library grounds and the intersecting part of Ivy street will be closed to the public and the Boy Scout organization will at once begin patrol duty and serve until the event is over. The police department also will give its services, and the teachers will attend the children, so that every precaution is being taken to safeguard the little folks. Spectators may occupy all sidewalks adjoining the park and library grounds except Ivy street, but under no condition will any one be allowed within the limits, except those in charge, and children from three to eight years old inclusive.

All members of the Roosevelt Parent Teacher Circle are asked to be at the park promptly at 12 o'clock, to assist in hiding the eggs and to arrange any final details.

The children are asked to assemble promptly at 1 o'clock on Ivy street, between the park and the library grounds. The children of three, four and five years have been assigned the park and will assemble on the east side of Ivy street. The children of six, seven and eight years have been assigned the library grounds and should assemble on the west side of Ivy street.

At exactly 1 o'clock the children will go "over the top" and there will be a merry time until the park has given up all its secrets. Any child finding more than three eggs is asked to divide with any one less fortunate. There will be no disappointed kiddies. The park will no doubt present an interesting sight, with its hundreds of eager searchers, all in double quick action.

U. S. LOANS TO ALLIES OVER NINE BILLION

WASHINGTON, April 18.—The treasury today announced the establishment of new credits for allies as follows:
Great Britain, \$100,000,000; Rumania, \$5,000,000, and Serbia, \$268,000. This raised the total loans of all the allies to \$9,138,829,000, of which \$4,230,000,000 has gone to Great Britain; \$20,000,000 to Rumania and \$27,268,000 to Serbia.

MOVIE STAR, HERO OF WORLD WAR AT RIALTO TONIGHT

Captain Robert Warwick is back after seventeen months in the service of Uncle Sam, with two gold stripes on his sleeve, two silver bars on his shoulder, the cap that signifies overseas duty, and a record to which he, his country and especially the screen profession may look with pride. He doesn't say what he did, but expresses regret for not having had the opportunity to do more.

After spending three months in officers' training camp in Plattsburgh, Captain Warwick left for France January 22, 1918; returned just one year later, January 22, 1919. He first saw duty in the trenches in France with the 26th infantry, at Ramboucourt, the Toul sector. He was with the First division when it went into action at the battle of Chantigne and was with the 10th French army north of Soissons in the Chemin des Dames sector. He was the first American officer in Strassbourg after the signing of the armistice; was aboard a convoy, just astern the Tuscania, when she was sunk, February 6, 1918, and had the honor of being military aide-de-camp to Lord Reading and Thomas Nelson Page, American ambassador to Italy, when these two visited the American front near Juvijay. When Marshal Foch reviewed the gallant 20th division of the French army after these veterans returned from the firing line, Captain Warwick was one of the few American officers in the citadel at Strassbourg, from which place of vantage the troops passed the French commander in review.

Captain Warwick is the only male star on the screen who served his country in France. Captain Warwick in "The Mad Lover," will be seen at the Rialto tonight and tomorrow in his first picture since his return.
