

GAGNON LUMBER CO. TO OPERATE THE BULLIS RAILROAD

Under a temporary lease obtained from Receiver Attorney T. W. Miles, and which was authorized by Circuit Judge Calkins yesterday, the Gagnon Lumber company is now operating the freight department of the Southern Oregon Traction company as a logging railroad. Receiver Miles will continue to operate the passenger car between Medford and Jacksonville.

The railroad will be sold by the court's order on May 10th, in order to satisfy the mortgage held on it by W. H. Barnum, its former owner, and will undoubtedly be bought in by Mr. Barnum, who will then give the Gagnon Lumber company a long time lease on the entire railroad.

The lumber company Thursday began the work of hauling logs from its logging camp on Jackson creek to the Gagnon saw mill in Medford, and Joe Gagnon says that by fall from five to eight million feet of logs will have been handled. The Gagnon company's new box factory will start up on South Fir street next week.

Incidentally the outlet thus obtained by the company through the railroad lease from its logging and timber holdings breaks the wood shortage in Medford which has long existed, for hundreds of cords of dry fir and hard wood have been piled up at the camp since last summer. The company rushed in two cars of fir wood to Medford yesterday and more today.

HIGH SCHOOL BOYS LEVEL LOT WHILE GIRLS COOK EATS

The high school adjourned this noon for the day as far as study hours and "schooling" were concerned, and the entire school student body turned in at 1 p. m. to begin the work of leveling the big lot back of the school building fronting on North Riverside and Fifth, and putting it in shape for the construction of two tennis courts for the school.

The approximately 100 boys of the student body did the physical labor comprising the shovel, hoeing and raking work, and the picking up and carrying away of the many stones, while the girls not only watched and encouraged them with smiles, but also fixed up a rest room in the building for the feminine students, and did cleaning work inside the building.

It was the girls' duty also to prepare a feed for the "men" workers, to be served late this afternoon at the close of the work day. This feed, it was rumored, would consist of buns and hot wieners and the like, and some liquid to wash the repast down.

Superintendent Davenport, Principal Baker and all the teachers were also greatly interested in the field, or rather lot-day, and the work was so systematized and planned as to get the maximum results out of the afternoon's labor. The boys were organized into working groups of eight men each under command of Prof. Jewett.

The school board had the lot plowed and furnished all the tennis court equipment. The student body is to do all the work.

At the start this afternoon it was problematical as to how much work would be accomplished by quitting time, but it was thought that the leveling process would not be completed. It was at first planned to have the work of preparing the lot done by the students on Saturday, but this idea had to be abandoned because so many of the high school boys work on that day and so Superintendent Davenport consented to dispense with the Friday afternoon session.

It is the superintendent's idea that the cooperative spirit engendered, the fraternal feeling resulting and the fostering of reliance upon themselves and their muscles, by this community lot leveling will do perhaps more good in an educational way than would the half day of lessons missed.
