WOMEN SUFFRAGE PASSES IOWA LEGISLATURE

DES MOINES, Iowa, April 10.—Woman suffrage scored a victory in the closing hours of Iowa legislature today when the measure according women presidential suffrage completed passage through adoption in the house by a vote of 84 to 2.

THE VICTORY LOAN.

THE following editorial appeal is made by Robert E. Smith, executive manager of the Oregon Victory Loan campaign:

Three Rivers, Alsea River, Eugene-Florence and Scottsburg-Alleghany roads, in the vicinity of the Siuslaw national forest, are not yet open for through travel.

Crater Lake Highway—Open and in fair condition between Medford and Prospect.

Barlow-Oakgrove—Open and in fair condition between Portland and Twin bridges.

Roseburg-Peel—Open but in bad condition between Roseburg and Peel.

Crescent City-Gold Beach—Open and in fair condition between Crescent City and Brookings.

BALFOUR WARNS HUNGARIAN SOVIET

LONDON, April 19.—(Via Montreal.) During the visit at Budapest recently of General Jan Christian Smuts, who was sent by the Paris conferees to investigate the Hungarian situation, he obtained from Bela Kun, the communist foreign minister assurances regarding the protection of foreign interests in Hungary.

The Press Bureau announces, nevertheless, it is declared, the Hungarian government is still endeavoring to confiscate foreign property.

In these circumstances Foreign Secretary Balfour has addressed a note to Bela Kun warning the soviet government that it will be held responsible for the fulfillment of its undertaking regarding foreign interests.

DEATH LIST FRENCH TRAIN WRECK NOW 33

PARIS, April 19.—The death list in the railroad wreck at Crisse, northwest of Le Mans, on Thursday, has mounted to 33, including 16 Americans. Forty-five persons were injured in the smash of the trains which was caused when an American train dashed into a French troop train.

Among the dead is a 16-year-old French boy who had been adopted as a mascot by American soldiers.
