

JACKSONVILLE GOES OVER TOP WITH \$17,500

County Seat Maintains Record of Banner Community in District—Campaign Does Not Start Officially Until Monday—Expect to Secure Quota in Ten Days.

"Jacksonville over the top with full quota of \$17,500." That is the word that reached Victory Liberty Loan headquarters at the Commercial club at 11 o'clock this morning. It was a great news, but not a great surprise as old Jacksonville has been in the front line on every drive since the United States went into the war and Campaign Manager Lewis Ulrich has been largely responsible for the place of honor that Southern Oregon's oldest town is proud of.

GOVERNMENT TO AID OREGON BOYS TO SECURE WORK

PORTLAND, April 19.—The United States employment service has completed arrangements in France and aboard transports for getting in touch with all soldiers needing assistance in finding employment, according to word received today at Portland headquarters of the service.

Harold Stone, director of the employment service in France, is in charge of the work and now has agents at Brest, LeMans, and St. Nazaire. He has two million application cards to cover every soldier overseas.

WOMEN WORKERS FOR VICTORY LOAN PERFECT PLANS

It was agreed in Portland that the women of the organization would not be called upon to personally solicit, but at Mrs. Getchell's suggestion it was agreed the local women should go to the front line trenches and aid the men in putting Jackson county over the top.
