## GRANT MINISTERS MINIMUM SALARY OF \$1200 A YEAR

The opening session of the Southern Oregon Presbytery was largely attended last evening and the outlook is good for a very interesting meeting. With impressive services the installation of Rev. J. L. Myron Booser as pastor of the local church was fulfilled. Prominent clergymen of the city were present and expressed their good will and congratulations to the pastor elect and the church. Rev. D. V. Poling, an old time friend of the pastor, now engaged in extension work for the O. A. C. was in the city and participated in the service.

The retiring moderator called the Presbytery to order and Rev. O. T. Morgan made the opening prayer.

Rev. E. P. Lawrence of Klamath Falls was elected moderator for the year and on taking the chair made an appropriate address. The sessions today opened at 9 o'clock with devotional services conducted by Rev. Louis F. Quick of Roseburg, Ore. Rev. Jos. E. McNeill was received from the Coos Bay presbytery, Rev. W. O. Forbes, D. D., of Seattle, Washington, Rev. Guy Wadsworth of Los Angeles are prominent visitors present to represent important denominational interests to the churches of Southern Oregon.

The moderator announced the following chairmen of committees:

Bills and overtures, L. Myron Booser; session records, C. F. Koehler; leave of absence, John W. Hoyt; resolutions, L. B. Quick; judicial business, J. K. Hallie, D. D.

The committee of home missions made its annual report to the presbytery. A forward step in the work was the announcement by this committee that every minister was to be assured a salary of \$1,200 and a manse as a minimum salary. This is an increase of \$200 over the past figure. Rev. Boudinot Seeley of Portland addressed the presbytery and brought a most encouraging report. The board in New York closed the year free of debt with a substantial sum to apply on the debt of last year.

Rev. Guy Wadsworth conducted a conference on the new era movement of the Presbyterian church. Presenting in vivid descriptive phases the changed and changing conditions of the world he set before the presbytery the great plan for enlarged work and activity. This presbytery is to be completely reorganized along the lines of this great movement.

The Presbyterian church is on the eve of the greatest development in its long and heroic history and has marshaled its men and resources for its great task.

This evening at 8 o'clock Rev. Boudinot Seeley of Portland is to deliver an address on the "Leaven of the Gospel." Dr. Seeley gave this address in Portland recently and it created a profound impression. At the earnest solicitation of the committee on arrangements Mr. Seeley consented to give this address at 8 o'clock tonight. Thoughtful people of Medford will be interested.
