**FORMAL PEACE TO BE PROCLAIMED CLOSE OF 60 DAYS**

PARIS, April 24.—(By Associated Press.) A clause has been drafted for insertion in the peace treaty fixing the date for the transition to a state of peace sixty days after the signing of the treaty.

The purpose of this provision is to prevent confusion among the more than twenty belligerent nations, which might fix different dates in their various ratifications. According to the present plan each nation will ratify the treaty according to its own laws but all will unite in a common date which will become a universal day of peace.

It is being considered whether the United States, as an associated power but not an ally, should sign a separate treaty of peace with Germany. It would be the same treaty as that signed by the allies and would be signed at the same time as part of the same ceremony.

**Jugo Slavs Obstinate**

PARIS, April 23.—(By the Associated Press.)—“If the Jugo-Slavs had shown the slightest inclination to concede any point in the Italian difficulty, the Italians probably would have been prepared to follow their lead,” was a statement made tonight in French circles.

“Both sides, however, displayed the utmost stubbornness, the Italians being too proud to give way,” it was said. “First, they considered that, as they fought throughout the war as a solid entity, they were entitled to consideration on that account, while the Jugo-Slavs, according to Italian view, became an entity only when hostilities ceased and after some of them had been fighting against Italy.”

It is recognized that both France and Great Britain are in a difficult position owing to the existence of the secret agreement with Italy as laid down in the treaty of London.

# DELAY ARRIVAL HUN DELEGATES UNTIL MAY 1ST

BY ASSOCIATED PRESS, April 24.—The arrival of the German peace delegation at Versailles has again been delayed, it is being announced officially, until May 1. It is declared that this additional delay is not unwelcome to the allied and associated governments, as there are many minor points which still must be cleared up before the final draft of the treaty is ready for presentation. The Italian crisis also will tend to retard the framing of the convention.

A further serious setback for the Russian Bolsheviks has occurred in the Ukraine where Kiev, the capital, has been wrested from them by Ukrainian revolutionists friendly to General Petura, the Ukrainian anti-Bolshevik leader.

The situation in Hungary is still shrouded in uncertainty. Reports as to conditions there are contradictory, one saying that the Rumanian advance from the east is progressing and that Czech forces are quite near Budapest, while another states that the Rumanians have been checked.

Mexico, it is officially announced, has recalled Alberto J. Pani, her minister to France, and it is rumored that the Mexican representative at Rome also will be called home. The inability of Senor Pani to present his credentials to the French government, although he has been in Paris since last December, is given as the reason for Mexico's action relative to France. Mexico also declares that she will not recognize the Monroe doctrine.

# SECURE WEATHER REPORTS ON FROST BY DIRECT WIRE

Thanks to the enterprise of County Agent Cate and the fine spirit of cooperation shown by Manager Glem of the local Western Union office and Manager Hammond of the Home Telephone company, the weather reports from every portion of the United States, Canada and Alaska are now received each evening in the county pathologist's office. It was a big step forward when the permission of the authorities in Washington to copy these reports each evening was obtained, but heretofore it was necessary for Floyd B. Young, the frost expert to receive them in the Western Union office and return to the weather bureau to make up the evening weather map, thus losing valuable time.

Now the Home Telephone company has allowed the use of one of its wires from the Western Union office to the weather office at very slight expense and the Western Union has donated the use of the telegraph instruments and installed them without cost. Mr. Young is now able to receive all the weather reports by direct wire without leaving his office in the evening and the weather map is completed within a few minutes after the receipt of the last report.

The weather bureau has offices in all the more important cities in the United States and Alaska, and thru cooperation with the Canadian government, telegraphic reports are received from several points in that country. At a few minutes before 5 p. m., Pacific time, weather observations are made at all these stations, including highest and lowest temperature, current temperature, wind direction and velocity, precipitation, cloudiness, etc. All these data are


Immediately condensed into a few words by the use of an ingenious code—an ordinary observation can usually be expressed in three or four words.

The reports from the entire country are usually received before 7 p. m. As fast as they are received they are entered by Frost Expert Young on a map after which it is possible to see at a glance exactly what the weather is over the entire country. It can be readily seen how important it is to have these reports promptly, and the installation of the direct wire to the weather bureau has added greatly in this particular, making it possible to issue frost warnings much earlier in the evening than would otherwise be the case.
