

CENTRAL POINT OVER THE TOP MEDFORD GAINS

Victory Committee Will Try to Raise \$123,726 in Medford Saturday—Voluntary Subscriptions Coming in Fast—What District Will Go Over the Top Last?

With ninety thousand dollars subscribed last night and fifty thousand dollars additional in sight today Medford will have \$123,726 to raise tomorrow and the coming week when it is expected to put the district over the top in the Victory Liberty loan.

Central Point went over the top last night with the full \$18,000 quota. This district may yet increase its subscription.

With Jacksonville, Talent, Rogue River and Central Point over the top and Ashland in sight of her quota but few outside districts remain to be heard from. The question in the minds of the committee now is "what district will be last to go over the top."

All the Medford banks are continuing to receive subscriptions for the Victory bonds and have made special preparations to handle additional business expected from the regular Saturday crowds that come to the city.

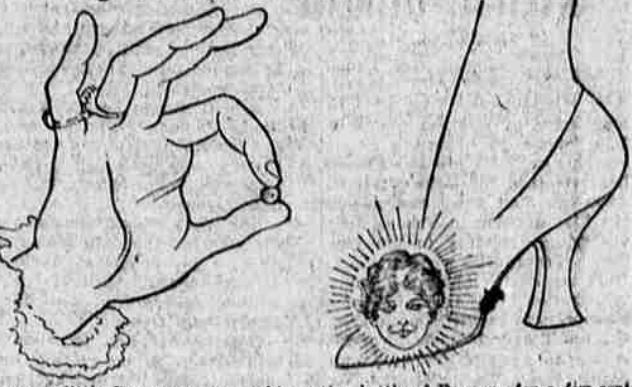
