

# MEDFORD NATIONAL BOOSTS VICTORY LOAN WITH \$30,000

The Medford National bank gave the Victory Loan quota a big boost Saturday with a subscription of \$30,000, putting Medford over the \$200,000 mark for the week's campaign and leaving only \$60,000 to be raised in order to go over the top.

Speaking of the bank's subscription President W. H. Gore said that he considered the Victory and Liberty bond securities the very finest and safest place to invest money. Not only do the bonds pay a substantial rate of interest but in the case of banks that are members of the Federal Reserve banking system Victory and Liberty bonds provide a security on which the government will advance the full face amount on a minute's notice any time the bank wires for the money.

Edge Point, Butte Falls, Gold Hill and Medford are the only districts in the northern part of the county that have not reached their quotas and no doubt these towns will all be well over the top by the end of the week.

Not only have they worked early and late but in many cases they have canvassed the same districts over several times in order that every possible subscription might be given to the government.

# FOUR MORE TROOP SHIPS ARRIVE AT AMERICAN PORTS

NEW YORK, April 28.—Among 2,181 troops which arrived today on the steamship Texan from Bordeaux were 36 officers and 1,148 men comprising the headquarters detachment and staff, medical detachment and companies A to F, inclusive, of the 18th Engineers for Camp Kearney.

On the steamship Freedom, from St. Nazaire, 1,712 troops returned today, the majority of them members of the 19th, 20th, 25th, 30th, 32nd, 38th, 48th and 70th base hospitals, assigned to various camps. Units included also the first trench mortar battery, (First division, regular army) five officers and 176 men. Bringing 354 casual troops, the steamship Lorraine arrived from Havre. The majority of these were men discharged from service, including marines.

NEWPORT NEWS, Va., April 28.—The transport Aeolus, bringing 3,384 officers and men, including Brigadier General Hubert A. Allen of Los Angeles, from St. Nazaire, France, docked here today.

Aboard the ship were five officers and 20 men of headquarters of the 56th infantry brigade; 86 officers and 3,118 men of the 138th infantry; four officers and 25 men of medical detachment and 106 sick and wounded.

The 138th infantry is a part of the 35th division (Missouri and Kansas troops.)

the laws and customs of war, according to a second proposed article, will be brought before military tribunals and if found guilty, "sentenced to the punishments laid down by military law."

All persons accused of having committed an act in violation of the laws and customs of war, who are specified "either by name or by the rank, office or employment which they held under the German authorities," will be demanded of the German government for trial by the military tribunal of the power against whose na-

tions the criminal acts were perpetrated. Article four is as follows: "The German government undertakes to furnish all documents and information of every kind, the production of which may be considered necessary to insure the full knowledge of the inhuman acts, the discovery of the offenders, the just appreciation of the responsibility."

# LEAGUE IS ADOPTED

The summary also had outlined amendments exempting national domestic questions from the jurisdiction of the league, providing for withdrawal of member nations upon two years' notice, leaving it to member states to decide what armed force, if any, they will contribute to any force which the league may determine is necessary to enforce its findings, providing that mandatories shall be given only to states willing to accept them, and stating definitely that armament reduction programs become effective only when approved by the states concerned.

# Two Cabled Corrections

Most of the congressional leaders were out of the city today, including Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, who will be the next chairman of the senate foreign relations committee, and Senator Hitchcock of Nebraska, retiring chairman. Two cabled corrections upon the text of the annex to the covenant were received today by the state department. In the list of original members the name of New South Wales was eliminated and that of New Zealand added. The word "no" was inserted at the beginning of the last sentence to correct an obvious error in transmission.

Some of the senators here, including Senator Johnson of California, republican, withheld comment today, saying they were studying the covenant text.

Senator Walsh of Montana, democrat, said he was gratified that the covenant reserved the Monroe doctrine from the authority of the league and said this would have a tendency to disarm many of the critics of the league.

"For myself," he said, "I never had any serious apprehension that we would have suffered anything in that respect under the original covenant. I feel the same way regarding the provision specifically excluding questions of domestic concern from action by the league. I felt that that principle necessarily was implied in the original draft."

# SPARROW NAMED TEMPORARY HEAD OF RANIER PARK

Alex Sparrow, superintendent of Crater Lake national park, is now acting superintendent of Ranier national park, has been for a week and will continue in that capacity, if necessary, for the next month or six weeks until the time comes for him to begin active work in Crater Lake park. He was sent to take charge of Ranier park until the successor of R. L. Reburn, who resigned a week

or more ago his four years superintendency of that park, is appointed. Mr. Sparrow had just returned to Medford a week ago after a two weeks visit at Yosemite national park when he received telegraphic orders from the national parks service to temporarily assume the Ranier superintendency.

Secretary Steel of the Commercial club has just received word from Superintendent Sparrow that national parks division has consented to not only allow all the autos carrying delegates of the National Editorial association convention which will visit the park on August 11th free admission, but also the delegates Mr. Sparrow has also notified Secretary Steel that all autos Ok'd by the Commercial club making trips to Crater lake in preparation for the visit of the editors will be admitted free.
