

### MAN SUSPECTED OF HORN BROOK MURDER HELD BY SHERIFF

Word has been received in Medford of the murder last Saturday on Ash creek, ten miles below Hornbrook of Charles Moon, a well known gold miner son of A. B. Moon, an early pioneer settler in Sams Valley after whom Moonville was named. According to report Moon was painting some dirt when he was shot, the murderer attempting to hide the crime by blowing his victim's head off with dynamite and burning same with coal oil. Troy Mays, a prospector in that district alongside of whose cabin Moon had a tent, missed Moon Sunday and making search soon discovered the unfortunate man. He gave the alarm and on Tuesday Sheriff A. A. Calkins of Blakely county arrested Joseph Isakewski, a settler in that district as a suspect. The coroner's jury rendered a verdict that Moon came to his death at the hands of parties unknown. Isakewski stoutly maintained his innocence but made so many conflicting statements that he is being held pending further investigation.

Mr. Moon was a member of a very large family, there being thirteen children born to his parents, of whom eight are still alive. The brothers nearby are Newman Moon of North Bend, Coos county, and Ralph Moon of Fort Klamath, Klamath county. The latter arrived on the scene Tuesday evening, being brought to Yreka by Mr. and Mrs. Lindsey Sisemore of Kort Klamath.

### TWO MEDFORD BOYS HOME FROM SERVICE

"Here comes Mutt and Jeff" laughingly remarked D. T. Lawton this forenoon as two soldiers swung off the sound bound passenger train and happy at their return, home hurried towards the depot, being halted at every few steps by friends reaching for handshakes.

They were Clarence A. Keisur, overseas veteran of the famous 91st division, over 6 feet tall, and John Kalabokas, 5 feet 3 inches in height. Keisur arrived from Fort Russell, Wyo., where he was mustered out of service and Kalabokas from Camp Lewis where he left Uncle Sam to shift alone. Keisur, a well known Medford boy, and his erstwhile traveling partner, presented a contrast in more ways than in height, altho they presented a good illustration of the democracy of the army. Keisur, of American stock, was in

the army for a year, ten months of which time was spent in France in service with the 246th machine gun company which was in the thick of the fighting. Kalabokas, of Greek nativity, an orchard laborer in the valley for several years, had been in the service for almost two years in the 14th infantry, which did not get ordered overseas.

### 56 JEWS MURDERED IN POGROM AT PINSK

LONDON, May 1.—Fifty-six Jews have been killed in a pogrom at Pinsk, says a report from Copenhagen to the central office of the Zionist association. Forty persons were imprisoned and brutally treated it is said, and three women flogged. The synagogues are reported to be closed and Jews have been impressed at forced labor.

But as yet we stand only at the threshold of happier times. To enter we must fulfill to the utmost the engagements we have made. The Victory Liberty loan is the indispensable means. Two years ago we pledged our lives and fortunes to the cause for which we have fought. Sixty thousand of our strongest sons have redeemed for us that pledge of blood. To redeem in full faith the promise of this sacrifice we now must give this new evidence of our purpose."
