SECRET SERVICE IS BUSY TRACING UP TERRORIST CLUES

NEW YORK, May 1.—With discovery and frustration of a nationwide bomb conspiracy yesterday against lives of prominent Americans every federal and municipal government agency was at work today in an attempt to trace the authors of the terrorist plot and to guard against the "red" boast of a "country-wide surprise on May Day."

New York's "bomb squad" under the direction of Inspector Faurot and detectives watched the haunts of every known radical here and it was intimated by the police that before night there would be a round-up.

Thirty-six bombs have been delivered or intercepted in various cities. Postmaster Patten said that "evidently the packages were mailed with a view of reaching addressees on or about May 1. This was indicated by the fact that parcels reaching the Pacific coast bear the postmark of April 23. Those detained here were mailed April 26."

Postmasters Warned
The packages identified were sent from New York, postal authorities believe others may have been sent from other cities. Postmasters throughout the country have been warned to be on the lookout.

The police today made further examinations of the 16 packages found in the general postoffice yesterday where they had been held for three days because of insufficient postage. Bomb experts worked six and one-half hours in opening one of the packages. Owen Ragan expressed astonishment at the ingenuity of the contrivance.

The packages in size and shape are suggestive of a biscuit package. Members of Gimbel Brothers firm reiterated today that the printed wrappers on the packages were faked.

2 OFFICERS AND 14 MEN DROWNED OFF BREST COAST

WASHINGTON, May 1.—Two officers and 14 men of the crew of the naval tug Gypsum Queen were drowned when that vessel struck a rock and sank near Armen light, off the coast of France, on April 28, while returning to Brest after assisting a fleet of mine sweepers in distress.

Three of the sweepers, the Courtney, Douglas and the James, foundered during a severe storm. All members of their crews and 17 officers and men of the Gypsum Queen were rescued by tugs and destroyers.

The mine sweeping convoy was returning to the United States from Brest. When eight hours out it encountered severe weather and turned back. Tugs and destroyers answered calls for assistance, but in spite of their efforts the three sweepers went down. The Courtney at 7 p. m. April 27, the Douglas two hours later, and the James at 11:50 a. m. April 28.

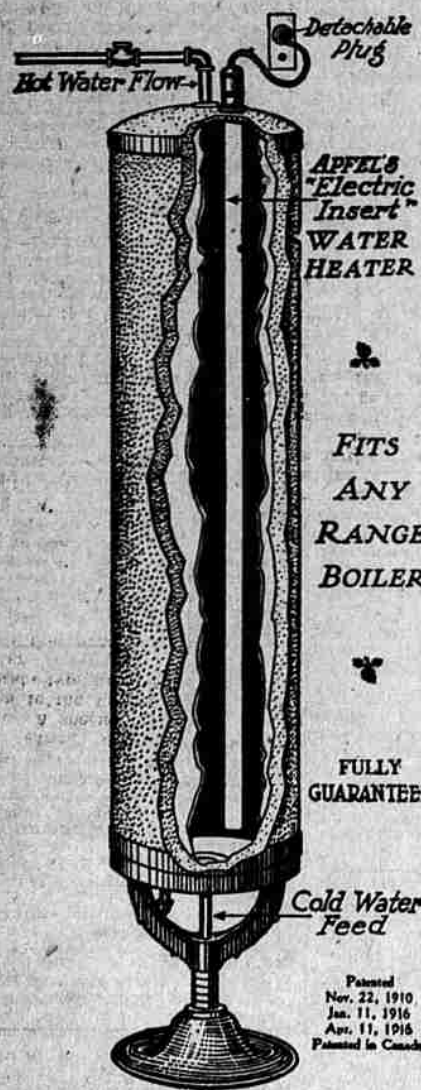

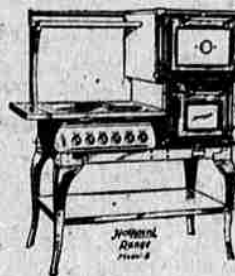
